If that Corvallis-Eugene railroad company with headquarters at Junction, extends a line as intimated in its articles of incorporation, to Coos bay, when will the recently revived Eugene and Siuslaw railroad company show signs of life again?

If the proposed easy-grade road over the Nelson and Chickahouiny route is ever built, the mail stage with its passengers and freight will always go that route and send a horseman up the Siuslaw. Besides, the Alpha mail route will be shortened about a dozen miles and there will surely be a post office on Chickahouiny that will do more business than several on the present routes.

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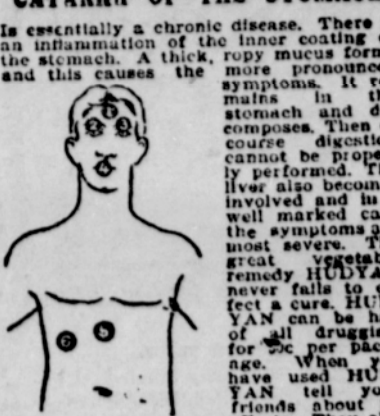
