PRACTICE DRILL.

The fire company were called out Tuesday evening for a practice drill and to try the new fire extinguishers recently purchased by the city. A fire was built on the river bank below the cannery. Two large old fishing skiffs were turned up on the side with tops together to give something the shape of a small building, then another skiff was broken up and piled inside. The heap was then saturated with kerosene and ignited. As coal tar several times was freely used on the boats several times it was but a few moments till the whole heap was in flames. Foreman Bernhardt then ordered that a stream from one of the extinguishers be turned on the fire and in little more than a minute the flames were under control, even before all the contents of one machine had been used. The fire was then allowed to start and after the sides of the boats began to fall in, another stream was turned on the heap. Its effect was quickly shown and it would have taken but a very short time to extinguish the fire, but as the object had been to test the machines, and their working proved satisfactory the fire was allowed to burn out. The opinion of all who witnessed the test is that the extinguishers are "all right," though one man jokingly declared that he could do as well at fighting fire with his spray pump. However, as his pump was twenty miles away he was safe enough in talking so far as an immediate test of its merits are concerned. All agree that the extinguishers will afford considerable protection against fire for the property in town and that some apparatus for fighting fire was very much needed.
