Governor Geer has granted full pardon to Charles Montgomery, one of the men convicted of robbing the grave of W S Ladd. The reason for the pardon was that Montgomery had already been imprisoned three months longer than his sentence required.

Prof A M Collier has accepted the position of professor of science in the Willamette University of Salem to succeed to the chair lately made vacant by the resignation of Prof I G Cochran. Prof Collier is a brother of Lane county's surveyor C M Collier.

The following were the successful candidates at the Roseburg city election held Monday: W R Willis, mayor; Dan Fisher, H Wollenburg, G W Kruse and F W Wooley, councilmen; D S West, recorder; F W Dillard, marshal. Number votes cast, 219.

By orders from the postoffice department all postmasters were to begin Oct 4th to accurately weigh the outgoing mail for 35 days. The mail has to be separated into domestic, foreign, first, second, third and fourth class, registered etc, and accounts of each kept separately.

Guard: J D Matlock, E D Matlock and wife and Miss Bertha Matlock left Lake Bennett September 26 for Dawson City, taking with them about 25 tons of merchandise, and will probably start a store at Dawson or go to the Cape Nome country. The Messrs Matlock disposed of their store at Lake Bennett.

BY FALSE PRETENSES. Alleged Swindle Practiced by Two Alsea Men. MONROE, OR, Oct. 9.—A Wilhelm & Sons, of this place, made a discovery Friday, that may lead to the placing of several persons in the penitentiary. For some months past, it has been the custom of residents in the Alsea country to peel casera or chittum bark, dry and sort it, and then bring it to Monroe for sale. Among those who followed this line of work was a firm composed of C B Fleece and W B Taylor, which turned in unusual quantities of the medical article. By an accident to one of the sacks of bark supposed to have been purchased from this firm, Wilhelm found the contents were not just what he had been heretofore supposed to be, since rock, stones, oak and fir bark, besides other articles, were mixed in with the salable bark. Saturday morning Fleece came into town with another load, but scenting danger shortly after arriving, turned his horses' heads Alsea-ward, but he was too late. Officers stopped him before he had gone a mile from town, examined his load and arrested him.

SALMON HATCHERY Fish Commissioner Reed informs that he expects to send salmon eggs from California to the Mapleton hatchery again this winter. Next year he proposes to make preparations to take fish at head of tide for the hatchery.

He left this morning for a trip down the coast as far as Rogne river. He expects to locate a hatchery on Coos river next year, and proposes also to establish one at Tillamook.

WENT ASHORE. Last Sunday afternoon about two o'clock, while the schooner Bella was trying to sail into the Siuslaw river, she was driven ashore on the south spit by adverse winds. As it was just before high tide she could not get off at that time. News of the mishap was brought to Florence and a messenger was sent to Yaquina after the Robarts.

Scows were taken down by the Lillian and the freight on the Bella was loaded on them and brought to Florence. The Robarts arrived Monday and assisted in the work. At high tide the vessel was moved some two or three hundred yards toward the river and on Tuesday she was taken nearly to the channel. Wednesday the efforts were crowned with success and the vessel was floated off and towed to Florence.

The vessel is not leaking much as it took but a few minutes to pump out the water before she was finally pulled off the spit. After an examination it was found that the schooner was but slightly damaged and she will be ready for another trip in a few days. Fortunately the ocean was not rough or the vessel might have gone to pieces.

A BANK CAVED. A Man Killed in a Sewer Ditch. Last Monday afternoon while working in a sewer in Eugene, a man named Stephen New was killed by the bank caving on him. The ditch is about 12 feet deep where the accident occurred and the unfortunate man was covered up to his neck and a 12 inch cribbing board held against his breast with tons of dirt. He was dug out as quickly as possible and efforts made to resuscitate him but without avail. The coroner's jury returned a verdict that he came to his death by suffocation and charged the contractors, Barker & Mummy, with gross negligence in failing to properly crib the ditch. Mr New came to Eugene with his family from Tillamook a few weeks ago. They are in destitute circumstances. The city council voted them \$50 assistance.
