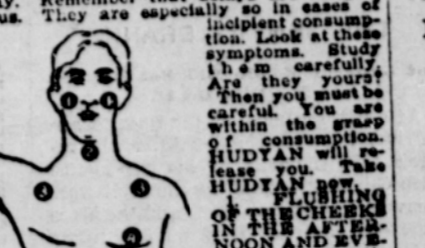

The railroad and steamboat companies have put the fares down to specially low rates, and now is the most favorable time to visit Portland and the exposition.
