WESTLINGS.

Another case of diphtheria is reported in Eugene by Tuesday's Guard, the sufferer being a three year old son of Thos Witt.

The appraisers estimated the damages to John Lawson's land from laying out the Barnhardt road at \$5. No one else was allowed any damages.

Mr Benedict informed us yesterday that he thinks the high water brought down about 2000 logs to the upper boom within the past few days.

W C Conner who has had charge of the editorial department of the Roseburg Plaindealer for some time past has severed his connection with that paper.

The claim of E C Smith against the steamer City of Eugene has been settled and the boat is running again. She has in sight over two thousand dollars worth of freight at a paying rate.

We understand that Ole Rice who lately arrived on the river from Fisher Minn has purchased Mark Hadsall's farm and stock in Mapleton precinct. The consideration is said to be about \$4,000.

A letter from Eli Bangs dated Nov 27, 1899, states that he will have the wagon on the road every day now. The roads have been repaired to some extent so that it is possible to run the wagon for a time at least.

Guard: It is now generally conceded that a letter has been received from the missing deputy sheriff, H J Day and it was mailed from Great Falls, Montana, although the contents of the same shows that it was sent to that place to be posted.

Gov T T Geer received a remittance on Saturday from the war department at Washington, for \$3,044.22, as a partial reimbursement to the state for the amount expended in the mobilization of the volunteers. The state's claim was \$5,172.51.

Each of the pupils has prepared a recitation to be given this afternoon in the presence of the teacher and pupils and any visitors who see fit to attend.

Guard: Sheriff Withers is now engaged in serving notices on delinquent taxpayers on the roll of 1898. The delinquent list is very small, there being only about \$2300 on it. Of this, the major portion is personal, and assessed against persons who cannot now be found, hence will not be collectible. When the list is published there will not be to exceed \$1000 to be collected on real property.

Guard: County Clerk Lee has received from Portland the necessary registration books and blanks to properly comply with the law passed by the last legislature. Registration begins with the county clerk in January and ends the last of May. However, a man can register on election day by six freeholders swearing the voter is qualified. The law will make considerable extra work for the county clerk.

Miss Lula Whisman while visiting at H H Fisk's took a severe fall which resulted in a badly sprained shoulder and arm.

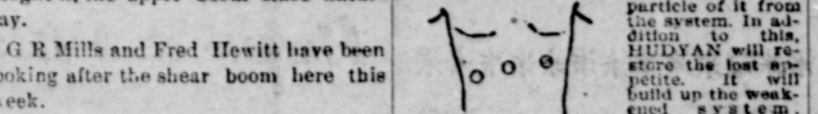
