Washington, D. C., Jan 15, 1900.

Congress has nothing to brag of in the shape of work accomplished during the past week, and if it continues to confine its work to the offering of scores of resolutions...

The most noteworthy feature of the hearing before the senate elections committee, in the Clark bribery case, is the contradictory nature of the evidence given.

The house interstate and foreign commerce committee doesn't intend to wait for the report of the isthmian canal commission. It has ordered a favorable report on the Hepburn bill for the construction of a canal over the Nicaragua route.

Representative Pearre, of Maryland believes that the tariff offers the best method for controlling trusts, and keeping them from becoming too greedy...
