WASHINGTON LETTER.

FROM OUR REGULAR CORRESPONDENT.

Washington, D. C., Mar 12, 1900. The senate did not take kindly to the proposal to pension ex-Queen Liliuokalani, of Hawaii, and after some plain talk from a number of senators, the amendment to the diplomatic appropriation bill, offered by Senator Hoar, providing for the payment of \$20,000 to the ex-queen, and \$10,000 a year for the rest of her life was laid on the table. Several senators expressed willingness to vote for an appropriation of money to be given to the ex-queen as a gratuity but very decided opposition to pensioning her; but on the whole there was so much opposition that the amendment was tabled without a division. Senator Tillman voiced the sentiment of many when he said that if this woman had any claim at all, which he doubted, it was upon the people of Hawaii, and not upon the U. S.

It is certain that the Porto Rico bill will have to be amended to get it through the senate. It is proposed, and the proposal is likely to go through, that all goods from the U. S. shall be admitted to Porto Rico free of duty. It is also proposed that the 15 per cent duty on Porto Rican products shipped to the U. S. shall be still further lowered, but the chances are against that proposition going through. Those who were instrumental in putting the bill through the house, talk as though they didn't care particularly how the bill was amended, so long as the principle of the house bill—that congress has the right to impose duties upon the products of the possessions of the U. S. be kept in the bill.

Contested election cases are rather costly to the country, and something ought to be done to either make them fewer or less costly. For an entire week, the house has been engaged in disposing of two them, one from Alabama, and one from Virginia, while more important matters have to wait.

The plans of the friends of the Nicaragua canal bill in the house were somewhat upset by the request of the president that it be not taken up for consideration by the house, until after the senate disposes of the Nicaragua canal treaty. At first, it looked as though compliance with the president's request would prevent any canal legislation at this session, but the action of the senate committee on foreign relations, in amending the treaty so as to give the U. S. control of the canal in time of war, made it certain that the treaty would be ratified with very few adverse votes. While it is possible that England may object to the treaty, as amended, it is not regarded as probable that she will, as the amendment to the treaty is practically a copy of a clause of the Suez canal treaty; but almost the unanimous opinion in congress is that the acceptance or rejection of the amended treaty by England will not be a factor in canal legislation; that public opinion has decreed that there shall be a canal between the Atlantic and Pacific, and that congress will act in accordance with that decree.

Opponents to the French reciprocity treaty believe they have succeeded in shelving the treaty for this session, if not permanently. Secretary Hay has, it is understood, asked the French government to consent to extending the time within which the treaty may be ratified, one year. Meanwhile, the treaty will be considered by the finance committee of the senate, especially of the effect it will have upon our revenues.

The opposition to the bill providing a permanent lieutenant general of the army, has induced Senator Lodge to offer a joint resolution, giving the senior major general, while in command of the army, the rank and pay of lieutenant general. The same resolution was offered in the house, by Representative Moody, of Mass.

News of the passage of the anti-American meat bill by the German Reichstag, was received and discussed with much interest in Washington, but no action is likely to be taken either by congress or the administration, until the matter has made further progress. When Germany shows her hand, she will find that this country knows how to protect

the interests of its citizens and will not hesitate to do so.

Female physicians are rapidly gaining places for themselves in all parts of the world. A consular report, received by the department of state, quotes the following, said of them by Dr Kallmeyer, of St Petersburg: "Women physicians have established themselves all over Russia, and even their opponents must admit that they have achieved a respected position. Part of them are employed by the government and since last year are entitled to a pension. They occupy positions as county physicians, school physicians, physicians for the poor and the municipal ambulance system, etc." Gen Joe Wheeler will have no trouble in taking his seat in the house, if the president accepts his resignation from the army to take effect upon its date, Nov 23th, 1899.

USING TIDE LAND.

At the request of some of our readers we publish the following letter concerning the right to use tide lands. The letter was written to one of our citizens by a prominent attorney of this state in 1890, in reply to some inquiries on the subject.

H H BARRETT,
Glenada, Oregon.

Dear Sir:— In answer to your letter I have to say, that in Case vs Loftins, the suit involving tide front at Newport, Judge Deady did not decide that the state could not sell the lands between high and low water mark to persons not the owners of the upland opposite.

He expressly admitted that it could do so on the authority of old decisions of U S supreme court which he did not approve but which he was bound to follow. But he decided that no matter who owned the tide land, the owner of the adjoining uplands had the right to go across it to the water and for that purpose, if necessary to build and maintain a wharf to deep water and that the owner of the tide lands had no right to build a tramway in front of his land along the tide strip, between his upland and the water which would cut off his access to the water.

There were some other questions in the case but none that bear upon any question you ask. I think the state had the right to sell the "tide lands" and that the title is good against the original owner of the upland, but that the person who has bought it has no right to build any buildings or make any structures upon it which will interfere with the owner of the uplands using it for passage over it to the water. Further the town when it shall become a city, will have full power to regulate all wharves which shall be built upon it.

In 1874 his parents emigrated to the Pacific coast and ten years later settled on the Sinslaw where the subject of this sketch made his home till his decease. His mother, a sister, and five brothers are left to mourn his early death. Funeral services were held Saturday being conducted by Rev J G Knotts.

Germany has dispatched a military expedition to the scene of the disturbance to restrain the mob.

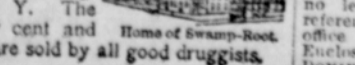
