CITIZENS' CONVENTION.

The citizen's convention met in Eugene last Saturday and was called to order by A. J. Zumwalt. F. M. Wilkins was elected chairman and L. H. Patterson secretary and L. F. Wooley assistant secretary.

After an address by the chairman the following committees were appointed. Credentials L. F. Wooley, M. J. Hilligas, I. E. Stevens; permanent organization and order of business, J. W. Baker, A. J. Zumwalt, L. L. Stevens, M. Martin, A. A. Foster. Resolutions and platform, R. M. Veatch, V. L. Holt, J. G. Stevenson, A. J. Pickard and J. J. Walton.

Adjourning till one o'clock. In the afternoon James Hayes, C. U. Beers, J. W. Baker and M. S. Wallis were appointed tellers.

Committee on credentials presented a report which was adopted. Committee on organization be made permanent. Their report was adopted.

For representatives W. H. Bangham of Pleasant Hill, Levi Geer of Walton, Chas. Harwood of Glenada, M. Wigle of Fern Ridge, E. R. Springfield of Eugene, Albert Walker of Springfield, Rev. Wm. Platt of Thurston and J. E. Tipton of Lane were proposed. Ballot being taken Bangham received 45 votes, Geer 190, Harwood 123, Wigle 9, Springfield 120, Walker 83, Platt 45, Tipton 3, Melly 1, Geer, Harwood and Springfield were declared the nominees.

For county judge H. R. Kincaid was nominated by acclamation. For commissioner S. G. Lockwood of Siuslaw, R. Y. Porter of Saguina, J. R. Hill of Richardson, Geo. Hale of Chesler, Geo. Smith of Willanette, Geo. Sears of Cottage Grove and A. J. Zumwalt of Irving were placed in nomination. First ballot Lockwood 5, Porter 8, Hill 66, Hale 41, Smith 6, Sears 35, Zumwalt 31. Second ballot, Lockwood 7, Hill 57, Hale 42, Smith 3, Sears 32, Zumwalt 14. Third ballot, Hill 122, Sears 26, Hale 37, Lockwood 4. On motion Mr. Hill was declared the unanimous nominee.

For clerk H. M. Millhorn of Junction City was nominated by acclamation. W. W. Withers was renominated for sheriff by acclamation.

For treasurer A. S. Patterson of Eugene and J. M. Kitchen of Irving were proposed. Patterson received 181 votes, Kitchen 22. Patterson's nomination was declared unanimous.

For assessors H. W. Graham of Eugene, A. A. Foster of Junction and E. R. Parker of Lost Valley were proposed. Graham received 52, Parker 128, Foster 2. Parker's nomination was made unanimous.

For school superintendent V. L. Holt of Eugene and W. M. Miller of Lost Valley were proposed. Holt received 44, Miller 153. Miller's nomination was then made unanimous.

Lincoln Taylor of Cottage Grove was nominated for surveyor and Dr. W. L. Cheshire of Eugene for coroner by acclamation.

The following resolutions were presented and adopted unanimously. To the Citizens' convention of Lane county, Oregon:

Your committee on resolutions begs leave to submit the following report: Resolved, That we are in favor of strict economy in all county affairs.

Resolved, That we believe the county court should let all work done for the county to the lowest responsible bidder.

Resolved, That we are in favor of re-enacting the mortgage tax law, and exempting all recorded indebtedness within the state.

Resolved, That we are in favor of a just and equal assessment of all property both personal and real of county and state.

Resolved, That we are in favor of the election of precinct assessors.

Resolved, That we pledge the support of our representatives in the legislature to the pending constitutional amendment authorizing the initiative and referendum.
