OBITUARY.  
Died, August 24, 1900, near Florence, Oregon, at the residence of her daughter Mrs Clara Mills, Mrs Salina Arvilla Deyoe, aged 68 years, 8 months and 23 days. Funeral services were held at the residence of Mrs Mills, August 25, 1900, after which her remains were interred in the Masonic cemetery near Astoria.  
On July 13, 1900, accompanied by her brother E. F. Batolph, Mrs Deyoe arrived in Florence for the purpose of spending a few weeks visiting with her daughter, Mrs Mills, and her brother, A R Batolph. Until within the past two weeks she enjoyed her visit and seemed to be rapidly improving in health. During the last week or two of her visit she suffered, more or less, from neuralgic pains in the heart. It was one of such neuralgic attacks which, early in the afternoon of August 24, 1900 hastened her death.  
Mrs Deyoe possessed some marked personal characteristics which it is well to note and profit by. Her physical characteristics stand out prominently. Though lately subject to neuralgic pains, her body was sound and strong, supporting a mind correspondingly sound and active—a mind of such a mould as to warrant the declaration that its possessor was talented. Again, Mrs Deyoe, in her dealings with those with whom she came in contact, manifested that spirit which may be called philanthropic. She sought and obtained the good, rather than the bad, will of everybody, thus, so far as is known, numbering among her acquaintances not one enemy, but hosts of friends. She was a typical mother. She was an ideal sister. She administered freely and cheerfully to the needs of others not her relatives. She sympathized with all the afflicted. She comforted the distressed and sorrowing. She contributed liberally of her means toward the support of the poor. She would discommode herself, if by word or deed, she could scatter sunshine along the darkened path of relative or friend. Yet again, the subject of this sketch possessed strong moral and spiritual traits of character. She loathed every form of vice. She was a Christian. Her Christian character shone forth in her everyday deeds and testimony. She exhorted those about her to Christian living. That she had unwavering faith in the Savior, was made clearly manifest in words set to music, when only a short time before her death, she sang, "We'll Never Say Good Bye to Heaven." That she lived as she exhorted and sang, this utterance, made shortly before her death, testified: "If it is the Lord's will I am ready to go." Truly, after a review of such a life lived on earth, and after a look at her face, cold in death, but warm in benign expression, one cannot but say: "Mrs. Deyoe lived in the keeping power of Christ, and died His Resurrection power."  
Briefly stated Mrs Deyoe's life history follows. She was born, Dec. 1, 1831 at St. Armand, Canada, her father being Rev. R. Batolph and her mother, Betsy Batolph. The greater part of her youth was spent in the state of Vermont. From Vermont she moved near Saratoga, New York, where, at the age of 17, she married J. W. Deyoe. After marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Deyoe, in 1854, moved to Illinois, remaining three years. Thence they moved to Iowa, where Mrs. Clara Mills was born. In 1874, Mrs. and Mrs. Deyoe migrated to Oregon; thence, in 1882, to the state of Washington; thence, in Oct. 1898, to Myrtle Point, Oregon, where, Feb. 25, 1900, her husband died. From the last named date to the date of her arrival in Florence, Ore. she lived in Portland, Ore., with some of her children.  
Mrs. Deyoe was the mother of 13 children, 8 of whom still live. Of these 8 surviving ones 6 live in Oregon, 1 in Washington state, and 1 in Nebraska.
