





A Kenntain of Alum.

In China, 12% miles from the village of Lion-Chek, there is a mountain of alum which, in addition to being a natdral curiosity, is a source of wealth for the inhabitants of the country, who dig from it yearly tons of alam. The mountain is not tess that' ten miles in circumference at its base and has a height of 1.940 feet. The atum is cotained by quarrying targe blocks of stone, which are first heated in great furnaces and then in vats filled with bolling water. The alum crystallizes out and forms a layer about six inches in thickness. This layer is subsequentbroken up into blocks weighing bout tes pounds esch.


