Coos Bay News: J. M. Tower, who is in charge of the governmental improvement, was in town Sunday. The eight benches washed out during the storm have been replaced in the jetty, and no serious damage to the embankment is anticipated this winter, especially on the old portion of the work. The channel across the bar is in splendid condition, notwithstanding the storms, and has a depth at low water of 26 feet.

The Roberts returned from Yaquina Tuesday, bringing a goodly quantity of freight, among other things being 1,200,000 salmon eggs for the hatchery at Mapleton. The Sinslaw hatchery has a capacity of 3,000,000 eggs, and this year it will turn out 2,000,000 salmon fry. Manager F. C. Bean is quite successful in conducting the hatchery, and would have secured the necessary quantity of eggs to supply it had not the rack been injured and the salmon lost by a great quantity of brush that came down the river during a light rain.

The tug went to South Bend Tuesday evening to telegraph for another tug, and brought 13 of the crew who came off in a boat.

A silk Chinese battle flag, blood-stained and full of bullet holes, captured on the outer wall at Peking, August 14, 1900, by Calvin P. Titus, a member of Company E, 14th Infantry, U. S. A., has been received at Spokane by Mr. W. H. Lee. The flag is made of red silk and is six by seven feet in size. On the flag are two large Chinese characters in white, which, according to Chinese interpreters, means "behind brigade," or what is termed as rear guard in our army. Mr. Titus was the first American soldier to scale the outer wall of Peking.


