A GREAT INJUSTICE.

The Siuslaw Left Entirely Out of the River and Harbor Bill.

The Siuslaw is left out!

That is the purport of a dispatch in the Oregonian of December 10, and now we are to plot along for an indefinite period of time because Oregon's representatives are too timid to hold out for the rights of their constituents.

This, H. Tongue, Oregon's representative in Congress for this district, was not at his post of duty when Congress was called to order December 20. In fact, only one of Oregon's representatives in either house was present, and it is no wonder, with this lack of interest in Oregon's claims for consideration, that we have been given the cold shoulder.

With the member from this district on the river and harbor committee, and with the recommendation of the engineers for a liberal appropriation, there is no excuse for this negligence.

The Siuslaw bar is, with the work already placed upon it, no better than if no appropriation were ever made and no work ever done. Unless the work is pushed to a completion we will have a mass of wreckage at the mouth of the river that will be a menace to navigation and cost a great deal more to complete than if the work had been left alone.

An indignation meeting will be held in Florence Saturday afternoon, and all who can attend should swell the note of the people's disapproval of the neglect. The citizens of Eugene and all Western Oregon should join us in the demand for our rights.

A good physician and surgeon would do well to come to the Siuslaw. During the past summer and fall there has been a great deal of sickness and a number of severe accidents and the unfortunate ones suffered a great deal from the lack of proper treatment, it being impossible to call the services of a practical man to their assistance. A young man of ability would find a large and lucrative practice in this field, and we would like to see some such person installed in our midst. With the large and increasing population and the constant expansion of business a better field for a physician could not be found.

The Oregonian on December 4th named its first fifty years of existence, and in honor of the occasion came out with a very interesting history of its struggles and successes in arriving at its present state of prosperity. The Oregonian is a brilliant newspaper, reflecting credit upon the entire country, and its promise of future centuries of thrift and enterprise is written all over the pages. May it ever be maintained in the progressive manner it has exhibited in the past.

President Kruger of the Transvaal is meeting with a rather mixed reception in his visit to European countries. He was entertained royally in France and the Netherlands, but Emperor William of Germany refused to receive him. While he has a great many sympathizers none of the nations of Europe can see their way clear to give him more substantial support.

SIUSLAW LEFT OUT.

A Washington dispatch of December 13 says: "The river and harbor committee, in executive session today, had under consideration some of Oregon's projects. Assurance is given that a sufficient amount will be appropriated for the mouth of the Columbia to insure the undertaking of the approved project, but the amount allotted is not yet decided upon. Inasmuch as the engineers recommend \$600,000, it is not possible that the amount will exceed that sum. "Siuslaw has been completely dropped from the bill, but other minor improvements, it is understood, are retained, with Yaguma yet to be considered."

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(FROM OUR REGULAR CORRESPONDENT.)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3, 1900.

Few sessions of Congress have opened more quietly than that which convened today. Advance knowledge of the fact that adjournment was to immediately follow the opening of the session in honor of the memory of the late Senators Davis, of Minnesota, and Great, of Iowa, served to lessen attendance both on the floor of the House and Senate and in the galleries and consequently to lessen interest in the short proceedings. Congressional interest is strongly centered in the Isthmian Canal question. Rightly or wrongly, the announcement that the Canal Commission had cut out of its report its original recommendation in favor of the Nicaragua route, and left it to Congress to decide between that and the Panama route, from the facts and figures presented, is taken to have been brought about by the shrewd lobbyists employed by the Panama Canal Company, and to presage a fight, which may cause scandal before it is ended; the lobbyists are also credited with pushing forward the ship subsidy bill, which is likely to be the bitterest fought measure of the session; for the purpose of displacing the Nicaragua Canal bill, which by resolution adopted by the Senate at the last session, should be taken up on Wednesday of this week. This last may have been partly the case, but there are other reasons why senators will not object to seeing the canal bill go over for a while. The Hay-Panamafoote treaty, has not yet been ratified, and Secretary Hay has just made a treaty with Nicaragua, giving the United States all the rights and "privileges" needed to construct the canal. Many of the strongest supporters of the Nicaragua canal bill think that both of these treaties should be ratified before the canal bill is seriously taken up by the Senate.
