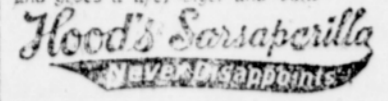
Heceta Lodge No. 111, I. O. O. F.,

A letter from Editor W. H. Weather-

having a fine time so far among our re-

for this country yet and but little snow.
The thermometer has been up above
freezing during the day for nearly a
week and has been below zero but once
since we arrived."

The schooner Sacramento reached San
Francisco December 30, 21 days from
Sinuslaw, with news of a wrecked schooner
which was sighted December 23,
100 miles out. The derrick was a ves-
sel about 45 feet length of keel, with a
top-cabin painted bottom. The stern
was well out of the water, the hull was
white, and there was a black oval name
board bearing yellow painted letters
with the words San Francisco, but the
name was too deep to be seen. The Sacra-
mento experienced several severe
gales, and December 15 was almost
wrecked by a heavy sea. In order to
save the vessel a portion of the deck load
was thrown overboard.

NOTICE.

ENGINEER OFFICE, U. S. ARMY.

Portland, Or., Dec. 28, 1900.

Attention of all interested is called to
the fact that the creation of any obstruc-
tion to the navigable capacity of any
navigable water of the United States is
prohibited by the Act of Congress ap-
proved March 3, 1899, unless first speci-
ally authorized in each case.

The construction of bridges, dams,
dikes or causeways over or in any har-
bor, port, navigable river or other navi-
gable water of the United States requires
the prior approval of the Chief of Engi-
neers, U. S. Army, and the Secretary of
War, and also the legislative action of
Congress, or of the legislature of the
state when the navigable water is wholly
within a single state.

The construction of any log-bum,
fish-trap, wharf, pier, dolphin, break-
water, or any other structure in any
port, harbor, navigable river or other
water of the United States, outside es-
tablished harbor lines or where no har-
bor lines have been established, is ille-
gal except on plans recommended by
the Chief of Engineers, U. S. Army, and
authorized by the Secretary of War, pre-
vious to the commencement of construc-
tion.

Violation of the above provisions of
the law is made a misdemeanor, punish-
able by a fine of \$2,500, and by impris-
onment for one year.

The dumping of any refuse, ballast,
sawdust, slats, or other solid refuse
from any vessel or other craft, or from
any mill or factory, into any harbor or
navigable river, or on the bank where it
may be washed in at high water or by
storms, is also prohibited. The violation
of this provision is punishable by a
fine of \$2,500, and by imprisonment for
one year, one-half of the fine going to
the person giving the information lead-
ing to conviction. In addition, masters,
pilots and engineers on vessels violating
this provision are subject to revocation
of license and the owners of the vessel
are subject to libel for the damage occa-
sioned.

All masters, pilots and engineers of
vessels and all others interested in pro-
tecting the rights of navigation are re-
quested to report to me promptly any
violation of the above provisions coming
to their notice. Information as to the
manner of obtaining authority for con-
structing fish-traps, log-booms, etc, will
be furnished on request.

on Christmas day from jaundice and was
buried at Deadwood Friday forenoon.
He was a widower with no children.

There was a merry Christmas on Nip-
son creek. Mrs. Marion Wheeler, in
the last week of her honeymoon, had for
nineteen hours been leading freely
from the ileum (the lower third of the
small intestine), the result of necrosis
caused by typhoid fever. A messenger
was speeding to Eugene for the medicine
when might possibly check the drain
and save her life, but there was little
hope that he could return in time. But
at 4 o'clock that morning the hemorrhage
ceased and the patient rallied and
there was Christmas joy in that
household. This hemorrhage is the
most dreaded feature in typhoid fever,
as nearly every case in which it appears
is fatal.
