SENATOR M'BRIDE'S WORK

As one example of what Senator McBride has accomplished for Oregon rivers and harbors we wish to call the attention of our readers to the official record as set out below in connection with the river and harbor bill for 1899.

Total increase in Senate Committee \$498,200. Including Tiltanook bay and the Long Tom river Southern Oregon received \$257,000 out of \$651,500 appropriated.

WASHINGTON LETTER

FROM OUR REGULAR CORRESPONDENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7, 1901.

The extraordinary period of good will, which began at this session of Congress and lasted until the holiday recess, has gone glimmering into the limbo of the past.

The old, old question of the respective power of the executive and legislative branches of the government has caused strained relations between the administration and a number of senators.

The report on the river and harbor bill says that although the amount appropriated is large—\$50,000,412—appropriations were made only when justified by the requirements of navigation.

Hearings on the oleomargarine bill are going on before the senate committee on agriculture, and some very plain talking is being indulged in, particularly by the supporters of the bill.

Senator McComas, who belonging to the opposition party can speak without prejudice, said on a subject that is being much discussed in political circles.

Bryan is an able man with much magnetic and mental force and he is always certain to have a following of some magnitude. Beyond all mere political beliefs, however, Bryan is a socialist.

A majority of the house showed their lack of sympathy with the race discussion that began as soon as Representative Onstaded, of Pennsylvania, seriously tried to push his resolution providing for an investigation of the restriction of the suffrage in Southern states before disposing of the reapportionment bill.
