He reports the road to be in a better condition than he was led to believe, and that the stage would be running soon. Two culverts are out between Glentena and Lake creek, and there is a bad washout above Lake creek bridge that will require the road to be placed on the mountain side. The drift in the roads will soon be removed and damages repaired so that the stage may make its regular run.

Fully 50 per cent of this timber cannot be accounted for, and in a few individual cases the percentage is much larger. FLORENCE-MARSHFIELD PHONE.

J. E. McMillan, representing the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Co., arrived in Florence Thursday via Barrett's stage line from Coos bay. Mr. McMillan's company proposes, if suitable arrangements can be made, to place a telephone line between Acme and Marshfield, touching at Florence, the life-saving station, light house, Gardiner, etc., a distance of about 70 miles, and requiring from 1 1/2 to two miles of cable.

The proposed line, which will probably be ready for use some time during the coming summer, will be of vast commercial interest to our citizens, and cannot be too highly estimated in the good it will accomplish.

Let one and all encourage the enterprise and see that this line is established at the earliest possible date.

The company has now a feeder running into Coos bay, which will be turned into a trunk line when the Florence-Marshfield line is in operation, and give a service equal to that of a line between Florence and Eugene. The route will also be valuable from the fact that it will not be damaged from storms very badly, as the country down the beach is quite open, so that there will be no heavy timber for it to pass through.

ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.

The friends of Frank Rollins will be sorry to learn of the deplorable fate that has overtaken him. Rollins, who is a bachelor of about 45 years of age and resided on Fiddle creek, in Douglas county, but in a scope of country tributary to Florence, had been missing for about a week, and Thursday a party was organized to hunt for him. Friday morning his remains were found a short distance from his cabin, where he had been killed by a large fir tree falling from a stony point above and exerting him in its precipitous flight of 200 yards down the hill. With the exception of one leg being badly crushed, the body showed no signs of having been struck. The remains were interred in the L. O. F. Cemetery, at Glenada, Saturday, and a great many friends attended the high esteem in which he was held by attendance. Mr. Rollins was a steadfast, honest man, and the community lost a substantial citizen when the sad accident causing his death occurred.

THE SCHOOL ENTERTAINMENT.

MANY BRIDGE REPAIRS.

The Eugene Guard of January 16 has the following: The commissioners' court has been busy all day attending to matters pertaining to the repairing of many county bridges considerably damaged by the high water and the replacing of not a few smaller ones, which were completely washed away. Men from all over the county have thronged the court room today to inform the court of the extent of damages in their several localities.

County Judge H. B. Kincaid informed a Guard reporter today that the north approach to the Eugene wagon bridge will soon be rebuilt and opened to travel. The small bridge across the slough just this side of Bushnell's place across the river was washed out, and Commissioners Hill and Edwards visited the place yesterday with a view of immediately replacing it. Judge Kincaid said that perhaps tomorrow morning at least two members of the court would go over to Coos bay to examine the wagon bridge across the McKenzie, also the road leading to it, which badly needs repairing. The Redford bridge across the Coast Fork will be repaired immediately and repairs on other minor bridges will be ordered as quickly as the court can get to them.
