Guard: The Frazer Iron Works have just completed the manufacture of two large "donkey" spools for use in logging camps. One of them is for the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co. for their logging industry on the Mohawk, and the other is for Frazer, Griffin & Sutherland to be used on the Siuslaw.

Oregonian: Eternal timbermen continue to register at the principal hotels of Portland, but no heavy purchases are reported. Some of them say that the settlers have come up on their prices lately, in anticipation of heavy demand, and so timber lands cannot be purchased so readily as formerly. A good many cruisers are preparing to visit the various timbered sections of the state, however, as soon as the weather settles. Much of the heavy timber on the higher mountains is surrounded with a foot or two of snow, and this will not melt until the weather turns warmer. Two Wisconsin timber men at the Imperial yesterday said that the distance from the eastern market would be a drawback to the erection of sawmills in Oregon for some time, but that the opening up of the Asiatic and Australian markets to Oregon lumber, would place the sawmills of this coast in a better position than those of the eastern states.

Coast Mail J. E. McGillivray, special agent of the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Co., went to Gardiner on Friday. Mr. McGillivray has been in this section for some little time, looking into the feasibility of putting up a telephone line from this city to Florence on the Siuslaw, via Gardiner. He will go once more over the route and then make his report, upon which will depend the construction of line. While the line might not at first be a paying one it would reimburse its builders in a few years, and it would be a great convenience for the people of the Umpqua and Siuslaw country. When it is built it will probably take in the two life-saving stations, at Coos and Umpqua, the efficiency of which would be greatly enhanced by having telephonic communication with each other and with the shipping points of Gardiner and Marshfield.

We often hear the shriek of the whistle of the steam sawmill at Alpha these clear mornings.

The Lake creek loggers lost but few logs by the storm, Steinhauer & Miller are the heaviest sufferers here.

Misses Maud and May Miller, of Chickahominy, went home Saturday, having visited at Deadwood and Lake creeks for a couple of weeks.

A second time bids have been received for carrying the mail between Hale and Inlow, and all rejected by the postoffice department, after one year of voluntary mail transportation.

Mrs. William Wheeler got a letter yesterday from her stepfather, Thomas Tabor, of Eugene, summoning her to his bedside, as he is very ill. He began the letter with his own hand, but could not finish it. She went out today.

Mrs. John MacVay, of Alpha, who came from the east on the strength of an advertisement and married MacVay, likes him, she says, but can't stand the Deadwood country, and if he will not go east with her she will go without him.

At last the road through Nelson bottom is nearly opened for teams after the January storm. In a few days wagons can pass through. Two of the six loads of Nelson creek have been done away with. Pedestrians will be pleased to know that the roads eliminated are those where boatways have been most needed.

The horse S. S. Miller bought from Lucas Wheeler, and which was broken to ride by 12-year-old Winnie Miller, dropped dead a few days afterward. He was in fair condition and apparently in full vigor. He ate well and was eating when saddled, but was ridden only a few rods when he began to tremble and fell down and died.

The Armstrongs, of Portland, who during the year have secured nearly all of the government timber land on Nelson creek and some on Lake creek, propose building a logging railroad up the Nelson valley and a mill on the Siuslaw, though how soon they will do it is not yet decided.

A railroad prospector who was looking up the feasibility of a road through the Nelson valley recently, said he found an easy pass from the head of Nelson creek to Goldson, and that there was a possibility of a railroad through to the valley which would take lumber in that direction, and send it thence overland to the east. In that case the road would be a permanent one.
