WASHINGTON LETTER.

(FROM OUR REGULAR CORRESPONDENT.)

WASHINGTON, March 11, 1901.

After deciding not to take up the question of a change in the rules or of reorganizing the committees, the senate made short work of the extra session called to act on the President's nominations, and adjourned Saturday afternoon.

In official circles a very hopeful view is taken of the Cuban situation, notwithstanding sensational press dispatches from Havana, and the opinion is expressed that the Cubans will, after talking awhile, accept the conditions laid down by congress for the removal of American control.

The ex-senators have been fortunate in landing presidential appointments. Ex-Senator Chandler has been made head of the Spanish war claims commission, which carries the same salary as senator and will last for several years.

A firm which has procured more than 22,000 patents for inventors, as C. A. Snow & Co., the Washington patent lawyers have done, have a right to feel that they have been instrumental in increasing the prosperity of the country.

The President is not discouraged because of the apathy of the senate on the reciprocity question, shown by the failure of a whole batch of reciprocity treaties for lack of action by the senate.

According to Prof. Charles W. Dabney, president of the University of Tennessee, who testified before the industrial commission, on conditions in the South, the South has entered upon a period of natural evolution, which will carry its industries steadily forward for years.

Representatives Cannon, Dalzell, and Richardson have a job that is not envied by any of their colleagues. They constitute the committee authorized to have the house entirely refurnished, including new desks for the members and new chairs in place of the old benches in the galleries.

Secretary Long's answer to the senate resolution asking whether officers in the navy, promoted from the ranks, were allowed to wear the same uniform worn by officers graduated from the naval academy, shows the senate inquiry to have been timely and pertinent.

ORDINANCE NO. 28.

An Ordinance providing for the building of a Sidewalk on the North side of Main Street from Jefferson Street to Monroe Street, along the West side of Monroe Street from Main Street to First Street, and along First Street from Monroe Street to Jackson Street, in the Original Town of Florence.

THE TOWN OF FLORENCE DOES ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That it be and is hereby ordained that a sidewalk shall be built on the north side of Main street in the original town of Florence from Jefferson street to Monroe street, thence along the west side of Monroe street from Main street to First street, thence along the south side of First street from Monroe street to Jackson street.

Section 2. That the cost of the sidewalks shall be paid by the lots fronting on said walk and carried out to the square on all corners, and the cost of the street crossings out of the general fund of the Town of Florence.

Section 3. That on said walk where it is more than twenty-four inches from the ground there be a railing or banister thirty inches high, 2x4, dressed on top and two sides, and posts 2x4 every eight feet, and a 1x6 eighteen inches from the walk, to be on the side next to street.

Section 4. That the building of said sidewalks shall be let by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Florence on contract or contracts to the lowest responsible bidder, reserving the right to reject any and all bids. The building of said sidewalks and street crossings shall be completed within 60 days from letting of such contract or contracts.

Section 5. All crosswalks shall be built the same as the sidewalks.

Section 6. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Board of Trustees and published ten days in the West.

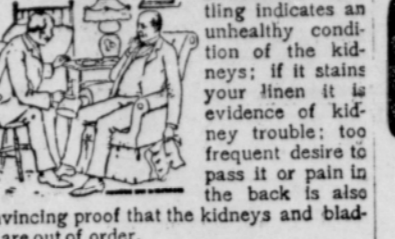

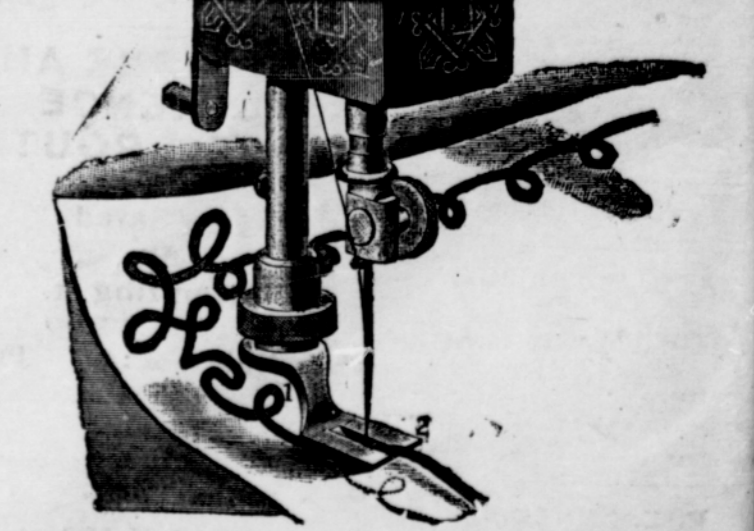
