IMPROVED FACILITIES FOR SHIPPING.

But a few years ago this part of the state had very poor facilities for sending merchandise to market or for getting in supplies such as were not produced at home. The merchants usually had their goods shipped to Yaquina, where they lay for weeks and occasionally for months awaiting the coming of a boat to bring them to the Sinslaw,

At that time Yaquina, besides being connected with the Willamette Valley by railroad, had regular steamboat communication with San Francisco. To and assist in developing her resources, a \$700,000 was expended by the general government, After some years the railroad went into the hands of a receiver, the steamer was taken off that run, the railroad was sold for an infinitesmally small per cent of its cost, and Yaquina of a few years ago.

On the other hand saw mills have been erected on the Sinelaw, a jetty is partly finished, schooners have been season a fine steamer has been running between San Francisco and the Siuslaw.

The shipping facilities of this place are constantly improving, and goods for the Yaquina merchants are now being shipped from San Francisco by way of Florence and reshipped to Yaquina.

It may be asked what has brought about this great change in the shipping business of this part of the country. The cause is to be found in the great timber resources of this valley. Standing along the banks of the Siuslaw River are to be found hundreds of millions of feet of the finest timber that grows in the world. To remove this timber and manufacture it into lumber for market will require the labor of a large number of men for many years and will furnish them the means of earning a livelihood for themselves and their families.

In connection with this take into conpideration, after the timber is removed, purchasing land on this river is laying a oundation for a comfortable fortune for himself and his family.

### WASHINGTON LETTER.

(FROM OUR REGULAR CORRESPONDENT.

WASHINGTON, July 8, 1901.

The post office department has begun a fight in which it is clearly right and in which it will be supported by all the strength of the executive branch of the government, but notwithstanding those advantages, it must get the support of the press and of public sentiment, in order to win a permanent victory. This fight is to shut the fake publications out of the privilege of second class mail. The government pays \$60,000,000 a year for carrying second class mail and receives promote her trade by way of the ocean less than \$4,000,000 for it. That much constructions never dreamed of when the law was being enacted-is apparent to everyone who has become at all familiar with what constitutes a large proportion of second class mail. In fact, from an investigation which has been today has failen far short of its prospects going on for months, the postal officials have been convinced that fully one-half of the matter now mailed as second class, should under a strict and perfectly proper construction of the law, be comcoming here more frequently, and this pelled to pay as third class matter. A new rule for the construction of the law is to be issued by the post office department, for the especial purpose of shutting out fake publications. When it is promulgated, look out for squeals from the owners of the fakes and from such legitimate publications as can be wheedled or paid to say that the business of fered with. 


