DR. HOLT'S ADDRESS.

Rev. W. S. Holt, of Portland, gave an address in the Presbyterian church Saturday evening, his subject being "The Crisis in China."

The body of the church was filled, but it is probable that a larger number would have been present had notice of the address on that subject been given sooner.

Having been a missionary in China for many years, Dr. Holt is familiar with the people of that country, their literature, habits of thought, and training, as well as the history of the causes which led up to the present condition of affairs in Eastern Asia.

The speaker was listened to attentively, and at his close the audience felt that they understood much better the causes for the hatred of foreigners so heartily indulged by the Chinese.

ATTACKED BY A HOG.

Last Saturday Joe, the six-year-old son of Frank Fox, of Linneus, was attacked by a hog and bitten in several places.

The boy and dog were playing in a field near a sow with a litter of young pigs, when the sow rushed at the dog. The animal eluded her and the vicious brute next attacked the boy. When rescued the boy had a number of wounds on his neck and one hand was severely bitten, besides bruises on different parts of his body.

WENT TO SEA.

Four schooners loaded with lumber for the city market were towed out over the bar Monday evening. They are the Bella, Nettie Sundborg, Danielson and Sacramento.

The first two took their cargoes from the Florence Lumber Co. and the others loaded at the Sinslaw and San Francisco Lumber Co.'s mill.

The four vessels together carried about 800,000 feet of lumber, which means several thousand dollars more for distribution among the loggers, the mill hands and their employees.

NEW CHURCH AT ACME.

It is now an assured fact that Acme is to have a church building, to be known and dedicated as the Central Presbyterian church of Acme. The lot on which it is to be erected is situated between those owned by R. B. Mills and Frank Sweet, and was donated for the purpose by Capt. Cox. This movement was begun about a year ago by the Presbyterians of this community and their adherents, and was completed at a special meeting held Sunday evening, immediately after Dr. Holt's lecture in the hall. Dr. Holt announced that about \$500 had been subscribed locally, and that \$300 would be added by the General Presbyterian Building committee. These amounts together with additional subscriptions led to the announcement that the building would be constructed in the near future. Capt. Cox, Dr. Sauterb and I. B. Cushman were appointed as trustees, and were instructed to incorporate at once with the work in hand. The building committee is comprised of Messrs. Hewitt, Hart and Burrell.

OVER 25,000 MEN OUT.

San Francisco, July 30.—Culmination of the labor troubles came last night when at a late hour the City Front Federation, composed of fourteen organizations, with 15,000 members, ordered a general strike, which was begun this morning. In addition to the 15,000 members of the City Front Federation, 10,000 machinists, iron-workers, cooks, waiters and teamsters are out, making the total number of men affected 25,000.

As a result of the strike, in addition to the general suspension of business in the wholesale and manufacturing districts of San Francisco and Oakland, the port is practically closed, as not a vessel can be loaded or moved. Members of the Employers' Association, which is the offering association, say they have counted the cost of the strike, and are prepared to stand firm. The steamship managers will act in harmony with the association.

A LONG WAY AROUND.

Last week James Bay, of upper North Fork, purchased a wagon from John Gibson, who resides on Indian Creek. The distance from Mr. Gibson's to his place is only about ten miles, but to get his wagon home Mr. Bay found it necessary to have it brought down the Indian Creek road to the Eugene stage road, thence to Mapleton, where it was loaded on a scow and brought to Florence, thence taken up North Fork by scow and boat some twelve or fourteen miles to wile, e the road is opened from Mr. Bay's farm, making nearly fifty miles the wagon travelled in bringing it from one place to the other.

This furnishes a striking example of the need of roads and of the convenience and saving of time by having plenty of roads in a country.
