THE SIALAW ROAD.

Roseburg Plaindealer: Regarding the newly proposed Florence wagon road mentioned on our first page, we are informed by Judge Thompson, that the matter will be fully investigated before one cent will be appropriated toward its construction by Douglas county, and no more definite assurance than this was given the party who called here to lay the matter before the county board.

Since there is a lack of harmony in the project among the people most interested and since the people of Eugene and Lane county would be almost solely benefited by the project, it is not likely that any action whatever will be taken in the matter by the Douglas county court.

THE STRIKE.

The labor leaders and employers in San Francisco seem no nearer an agreement than a week ago.

The supply of coal in the city is nearly exhausted and most of the bunkers are empty. Several cargoes of coal have arrived in port but the vessels are not permitted to discharge.

About 90 coasters and 20 larger vessels are reported tied to the wharves or anchored in the harbor.

TAX SALE.

Monday's Guard: The sheriff's sale of property for taxes under the law passed by the last legislature took place at the court house today. This sale is for all taxes to and including those of 1898. The bid covers all the old taxes previous to the former sale, and after two years will secure a good title.

There were something like 100 pieces of property sold and were bid in at from 25 cents to \$180. The total amount was about \$1200.

The sale will continue tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

WILL NOT REBUILD THIS SEASON.

In conversation with Mr. Kyle, superintendent of the Florence Canning Co. a few days ago, he informed us that his company do not intend to rebuild their cannery this season. He also stated that Elmore & Co. will not operate their cannery at Rose Hill this year.

This will leave the salmon business on the river this year entirely to O. W. Hurd, and with a good run of fish he ought to put up a large pack.

The Florence Canning Co. will erect a new cannery a short distance from the site of the old one and will probably be in the field for their share of the fish next year.

SHUT DOWN.

The saw mills here have been obliged to suspend operations on account of the strike in San Francisco. The wharves are filled and they have no place to pile their lumber.

The Siuslaw & San Francisco Lumber Co. quit sawing Saturday night and the Florence Lumber Co. on Tuesday, but both mills have kept a few men at work this week running the planers.

It is probable the mills will be idle till the strike is settled, as the vessels can not leave San Francisco to come in after lumber.
