OBSTACLES TO A PHILIPPINE CABLE.

Certain responsible private parties have proposed to the government of the United States to construct and lay a cable from this city to the Philippines by way of the Hawaiian islands and Guam.

The trouble arises from a "concession," which, with true Spanish improvidence, was granted to a British company on March 30, 1898—just previous to the breaking out of the war with this country—whereby there was conveyed the exclusive privilege of landing a cable on any of the Philippine islands until the year 1940.

And it is hereby declared that the relinquishment or cession, as the case may be, cannot in any respect impair the property or rights which by law belong to the peaceful possession of property of all kinds, of provinces, or of private individuals, of whatever nationality such individuals may be.

By virtue of this paragraph the rights of the Eastern Extension Cable Company remain precisely as they were under Spanish government, and if the grant held by the cable company was valid under Spanish law, it would appear that it is still valid.

Should the grant be found valid, and the United States bound to respect it, the only means of getting an American cable is to redeem the privilege by purchase. This right was reserved by Spain, and the purchase price fixed at \$3000 for each year of the unexpired concession.
