GENERAL NEWS.

It is reported that King Edward of Great Britain is suffering from cancer of the throat. Great apprehension is caused by the announcement.

A statehood convention has been called in Arizona to meet at Phoenix, October 25, to adopt plans for securing a state government during the coming session of Congress.

The Columbia defeated the Shamrock three times in the contest for the cup, each time by a very close margin. The Shamrock is considered the fastest boat that England has ever sent over to try to wrest the cup from the Americans. It has been proposed that the two crews exchange boats and try a race to determine whether the Columbia is the better boat or whether the result is due to superior seamanship.

STRIKE SETTLED.

After a strike of eleven weeks, the difficulties between the City Front Federation of San Francisco and the Employer's Association were settled by arbitration, October 2, the governor of the state acting as mediator.

The terms of settlement are nearly the same as those contained in a proposition which the Drymen's Association made to the Brotherhood of Teamsters on August 30, some concessions being made by both sides. As the Brotherhood of Teamsters was the first to quit work, the other organizations striking through sympathy, when the teamsters settled their difficulty the rest were free to go back to work.

It is understood that the employers will give work to as many of their old men as they can, but will not discharge their non-union men who are competent and who wish to remain.

OIL PROSPECTS.

A few days ago we were shown some pieces of rock that contain very good indications of oil. They were obtained by H. P. Johnson from a canyon near his residence on North Fork.

The pieces shown to us had been brought in some weeks before and oil or moisture of any kind would naturally evaporate some from being exposed to the air, but when the rock was heated it caused the oily substance to exude from the stone in spots and the odor was unmistakable.

Mr. Johnson has considerable experience in oil wells, having worked for four years in the famous oil regions of Pennsylvania, and he considers the indications strong that oil can be found in the vicinity where he obtained the rock. He intends to prospect further, and proposes soon to bore down and see what he can find.

OUT OF CANS.

There has been a good run of silver salmon in the river for some ten days past. About 4000 were received at the cannery last Friday and it used up all the cans on hand to take care of these fish. Word was sent out to the men that no more fish would be received at the cannery until Monday night, and the Chinamen set to work making cans.

On account of the strike in San Francisco the supply of tin did not arrive here soon enough for a sufficient stock of cans to be made before the run of salmon commenced; so now canning can be carried on only a part of the time, the fishermen being compelled to lay off the rest of the time to give the Chinamen a chance to make cans. This causes considerable loss and dissatisfaction to the fishermen, for which neither they nor the cannerymen are to blame.

HURT IN A RUNAWAY.

Jared Scott was badly hurt one day last week by a runaway accident.

He was hauling stovewood on the wagon, using dump boards instead of a box, and while driving down a small hill one of the reins broke and the horses started to run. The wood began sliding off and Mr. Scott went with it. One of the wheels passed over his right leg just below the knee and another across his breast. One of his ribs is thought to be broken, and his leg is badly bruised, but as there was about 1 1/2 cords of wood on the wagon at the time, he is fortunate that he was not crushed to pieces. Some of the neighbors hastened there and carried him to the house and made him as comfortable as possible.

He is getting along as well as could be expected, considering that he has been in poor health for two or three years.
