Parties started several times from Alpha and Blachley to look out a route for a short road connecting those places, and invariably got lost and came down Greenleaf Creek, until quite recently a crew resisted the magnetism of that stream and blazed the desired route.

S. S. Miller, of Chickahominy, came up from Mapleton this week with a wagon load of fine salmon.

Dry rot has appeared in many bins of potatoes.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

A special meeting of the city council was held Monday evening pursuant to call.

Roll showed Trustees Brynd, Christensen, Weatherston and President Morris in attendance. Absent, Trustee Evans.

President Morris stated that as the regular council meeting for this month was not held, this meeting had been called for the purpose of transacting any business that could be transacted at a regular meeting.

On motion the recorder was directed to have published according to law a notice of assessment to pay for building sidewalk on Main, Monroe and First streets.

On motion the recorder was instructed to advertise for bids for tending street lamps.

On motion the recorder was instructed to advertise for bids for constructing a sidewalk and crosswalks on Second and Madison streets as provided by Ordinance No. 29.

The following bills were presented and allowed: Hugh Cassidy, for board of prisoners, \$4.50; G. C. Cumpston, hauling lumber, building crosswalks and one month's pay as marshal, \$14; Florence Lumber Co., lumber, \$6.65; THE WEST, printing, \$4; Geo. O. Knowles, two and one-half months pay as recorder, \$2.50.

The recorder presented his quarterly report, which was accepted.

President Morris read several letters in regard to fire apparatus. The opinion of a majority of the council seemed to be that a tax should be levied by the city and the proceeds used as soon as available to purchase a hand pump and some hose to protect the property in town against fire.

Geo. O. Knowles presented his resignation as recorder. On motion the resignation was accepted to take effect October 23.

Adjourned.

AT THE CANNERY.

There has been a good run of fish in the river for several weeks and some good catches are reported. From 3000 to 4000 fish per day are received at the cannery and this keeps all hands busy to take care of them. Twenty Chinese are employed at canning, and since the big run commenced, five or six white men and boys have been assisting them. The shortage of cans has made it necessary for the fishermen to lay off a portion of the time, but the pack promises to be quite large and the fish are of good quality.

Quite a large quantity of salt salmon has also been put up, this being done at times when more fish were received than could be canned before they would spoil. This work is carried on at night by white men and does not interfere in the least with the work of canning.

A BRAVE BOY.

Last Monday afternoon a six year old daughter of John C. Beck, while fishing from her father's wharf, fell into the river. Her brother Morris, eight years of age, heard her cry of alarm and ran to the wharf. He could not see the little girl, but bubbles of air showed where she had gone down. He at once dove in after her, and though the water was about six feet deep succeeded in catching hold of the child, and after a hard struggle managed to get her out on the wharf, both of them being nearly exhausted. It was fortunate for both children that the boy is a good swimmer, else one or both would almost certainly have drowned.

A NEW MANAGER.

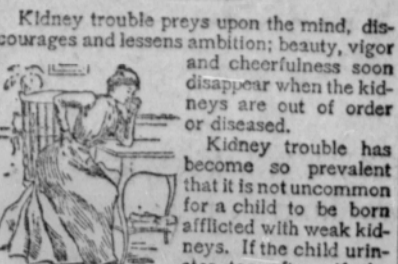
