ARRESTED.

Henry Hinkson, of Alma, was arrested and taken before Justice Holden last Friday, charged with opening the boom below Point Terrace...

This case is the outgrowth of a difficulty between the loggers and the boom company over an attempt of the latter to collect additional fees on logs remaining in their booms after October 1, 1901.

The freshest last winter brought down from the upper river to the boom several million feet of logs, which the boom company agreed, if certain information as to marks, to whom sold, etc., were furnished, to deliver to any mill not below Acme...

Mr. Hinkson owned a thousand logs or more of those caught at the boom and ordered them delivered to the Siuslaw & San Francisco Lumber Co. at Acme, but only a small portion of them were delivered prior to October 1.

There is a very strong feeling against the boom company among the loggers on account of the attempt to collect additional fees on logs remaining in the boom after October 1, and many of them say they will resist its payment.

The men also blame the boom company for the logs going to sea last winter, and say that if the company had taken due precautions the boom would have caught and held in safety all the logs that came down the river during the rainy season.

THE NEW STATE TAX LAW.

The proportion of the state taxes to be paid by the several counties, under a new law passed by the last legislature, is as follows, based on the assessments of the several counties for the past five years, preceding this, to-wit:

After 1905, until which time it is contemplated by the new law that the above arrangement for apportioning the state taxes will be continued, the apportionment will be made according to the average expenditures of the various counties each year for a period of five years preceding, as ascertained by the reports of the county clerks to the secretary of state.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(FROM OUR REGULAR CORRESPONDENT.)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21, 1901.

The Capital city is beginning to take on the activities of "this season" which covers the period of the session of Congress. Social circles are being reconvened, the theatres are in full play and the fall weddings are attracting the never failing interest.

The most talked of event of the past week was the presence of Booker T. Washington, the Southern negro educator, at a family dinner with the President at the White House.

The annual national convention of the devotees of spiritualism has been in session here the past week, evoking the usual lively debates between the believers in the cult and those who declare it a system of delusion and "fakirisms."

A local organization has been effected to promote the building of a fitting McKinley Memorial in this city. There is no purpose in this to interfere with the work of the national commissioners appointed by the President to further the erecting of a worthy memorial to the late President at his old home, Canton, in Ohio.

Washington is becoming one of the greatest student centers of the nation. The several universities already here and the large number of private and technical schools for both sexes are drawing annually larger contingents of young men and women from all parts of the country.

The announcement that General Miles, the head of the army, will report in favor of the law abolishing the wine and beer canteens from the army exchanges, has produced a sensation in the pro-canteen camps.

The transfer of the army school for engineers from Wilket's Point, New York, to Washington Barracks, in this city, has been effected. One of the best modern schools of army engineering in the world is to be equipped for the training of our engineering corps.

occupied and their reconstruction on our level of civilization, largely directed by our army officials, the engineering school becomes a doubly important institution.

At the White House there has been a great coning and going of public men during the past week. The President has been seeking the views of many leaders of his party, concerning topics of his first message and the legislation that should be most urgently stressed in the immediate future.

The return of Ambassador Choate from London is assigned to the pending negotiations for a new and satisfactory canal treaty with England.

The reports of Cabinet changes will not down. Secretary Root has returned to the city with his family and declares that he has settled down for the winter and has no intention of resigning.

The President goes to Yale University this week, where he will be vested with the honors of a Doctor of Laws. It is probable also that Harvard, his alma mater, will follow with similar honors next summer.

MINING AT KOYUKUK, ALASKA.

Harper Workman, who returned from Alaska a short time ago, gives us the following account of his trip home and description of the Koyukuk country:

A party composed of M. Oswood and C. Nelkey, of New York City, C. Dexter, of Syracuse, N. Y., G. Morrey, of Newfoundland, and myself left Coldfoot, at the mouth of Slate Creek, Alaska, on September 4.

A strike was made on Union Gulch near Coldfoot last August by E. O. Gillespie and W. Watt. They cleaned up \$1400 in four days and found a \$95 nugget.

Good prospects were found on California and Boulder creeks, tributaries of the south fork of the Koyukuk, and they will be opened up next summer.

Fred Morris and T. C. McNamer have taken out \$30,000 from Enma Creek this year.

At Gold Bench, on the south fork of the Koyukuk, Battles & Pickett are working a force of twenty men getting ground ready for the extensive operations next year.

John Morris and C. Dexter are the principle miners of Myrtle Creek. There is an immense unprospected country up there but all the creeks near Coldfoot have been staked.

Coal of good quality has been found at Tramway bar, 17 miles below Coldfoot. The vein is five feet in thickness and its width is not known.
