Last week we left our readers contemplating an improvement in swings. Adjacent to the one last described was a velocipede rink, where a diversified crowd congregated to witness the evolutions, contortions and mishaps of a lot of novices in that style of locomotion.

After supper we returned to the fair grounds and dropped into the circus, which was uncomfortably crowded. The performance (what little there was of it) was passable, excepting the splendid performance of Mr. Kingsley, the bare-back rider, who is one of the best performers in his line we have ever seen.

Next morning, Friday, a heavy mist obscured everything until about 10 o'clock, when Old Sol burst forth in all his splendor, much to the relief of the dampened spirits of the multitude.
