YAMHILL.—The Fall term of the Circuit Court for Yamhill county has been in session this week. There are four cases of murder on the docket, besides numerous cases of felony.

P. S.—We have since learned that the Grand Jury failed to indict either of the parties charged with murder, which causes considerable excitement in the community, and suspicions of bribery and foul play are rife.

A SECRET ENEMY.

It is a fact patent that the worst enemies the Democratic party has had to encounter during the decade past have been of its own household. Self instituted leaders have placed themselves prominently in front for the apparent purpose of proving treacherous at the hour of direst need.

Another fresh proof of the enormous treason of the World is found in the weekly edition of Oct. 20. In an article on "Pendleton—Packer," speaking of their defeat as gubernatorial candidates, it says that their defeat shows the wisdom of the last National Convention in not taking either, and that "Governor Seymour, who had been making very able speeches against Mr. Pendleton's financial views, was a much wiser selection; but he went into the race so handicapped that the canvas had not the full benefit of his wisdom and sagacity.

ABOUT INDIANS—IMPORTANT.

Complaints have been made to the Grande Ronde Indian Agency that numerous Indians belonging to that reservation are prowling around through this county without any "passes," being harbored and abetted by certain citizens, and urging the prosecution of said citizens for violation of the law in the case made and provided. Captain La-follet does not wish to pursue this harsh course, as he believes the parties in question do not err willfully, but from ignorance of the law in the premises.

Sec. 1.—It shall be unlawful for any person to entice, induce or persuade any Indian or half-breed, who habitually resides with Indians, to leave the Indian reservation or territory, where such Indian or half-breed belongs, or to harbor or conceal such Indian or half-breed, or in any way assist such Indian or half-breed to escape from, elude the agent or superintendent having charge of the tribe, unless such Indian or half-breed is absent by the written consent of the superintendent or agent aforesaid.

Sec. 2.—Any person who is guilty of a violation of section 1 of this act, shall be liable to a fine of twenty-five dollars for the first offense, and not less than fifty nor more than one hundred dollars for each subsequent offense, to be recovered in an action for debt, before any circuit court, or county judge, or justice of the peace in this State.

Sec. 3.—All fines collected under this act shall be paid, one-half to the person making the complaint, and the other half to the common school fund of the county where the offense was committed.

THANKSGIVING.

Next Thursday, Nov. 18th, has been appointed by the President, and re-appointed by the Governor of Oregon, as "a day of public thanksgiving and praise to Almighty God." Now we have a wholesome reverence for religious forms and exercises, and so, we believe, have the people of Oregon generally; but we think these proclamations will fall on the public ear still-born. That we should feel grateful to the Omnipotent that he has thus far protected our lives from the insane fury of a set of Godless fanatics, we believe; and that we should pray to the Author of all good to deliver our country and our government from their hands into the control of those who can with propriety address the Creator as humble worshippers and believers in his divine law, is our duty. But that we should do this at the behest of an imbecile who has ever shown contempt for things sacred, and a mountebank who, although he professes to be a Christian, has given the lie to his professions by his disgraceful conduct in public affairs, would be simply blasphemy. Can these hypocrites expect to deceive the Omnipotent by such devices? Can they have reflected for a moment that the Almighty will hold them responsible for their every act when He brings into judgment every nation, kindred, and individual—every tongue and people—in the last day? Let us hope they did not; for if they did, terrible will be the retribution of offended Deity.

ATTEMPTED OUTRAGE.—The Statesman learns, from parties at Lafayette, that last week two young fellows about fifteen years of age, succeeded in obtaining possession of a quantity of chloroform, and in administering it to a young lady of about the same age, with the intention of stupefying her and then violating her person. They were fortunately discovered before their villainous design was accomplished, and we learn they are supposed to have absconded; probably they have been helped off to California to avoid any disagreeable consequences that may follow the action of the grand jury now in session. These young fellows come of very respectable families, but have not been a credit to their connections for some time.

THE NOVEMBER ELECTIONS.

Last week elections were held in Arkansas, Alabama, Florida, Illinois, Nevada, Kansas, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New York and Wisconsin. Owing, probably, to the disordered condition of the telegraph wires, the returns are very incomplete; sufficient is known, however, to arrive at a tolerably definite conclusion as to the general result.

Wisconsin is gone Republican by considerably reduced majorities. In Massachusetts, Claflin (R) is elected Governor by about 8,000, and the prohibitionists are beaten for the Legislature by the license men. Thirty-seven towns in Minnesota give a Democratic majority of two hundred, but it is thought the State will go Republican by a small majority. In Maryland, New Jersey and New York the Democrats have made a clean sweep of everything. The Tribune claims Illinois for the Republicans by 7,000. We have seen no reports from the other States.

Later advices say that the Republican majority in Wisconsin is about 850, the Democrats gaining several members in the Legislature. The Republican majority for Governor of Minnesota is only about 1,500. The temperance tickets have been almost totally ignored wherever they were run. Kansas dates from Leavenworth and Atchison report those cities, with their respective counties, as having been carried by the Democrats.

In every State, as far as heard from, the Democratic gains are immense, and are highly encouraging. "There's a good time coming, boys."
