RADICAL REPUDIATION.

Secretar Boutwell, who during the impeachment trial of Andrew Johnson gravely suggested that he should be transported to the "hole in the sky" close by the Southern Cross; and who last summer took a vacation and visited his old home at Groton, Massachusetts, and on hi return oracularly announced that nation was on the high road to prosperity-that everything was lovely and the goose was hanging high, all because his townspeople in a New England village. for which the people of every other portion of the Union are made to pay tribute, through tariffs, taxes and bounties, were very prosperous, fat and san cy; and who, along with every other ranting, canting Radical in the land rolled his eyes in holy horror at the very mention of repudiation, and ut tered lengthy diatribes about the sacredness of the national honor, has at last come out flatly and squarely for repudiation.

Everybody knows that the Radicals to a man declare that Pendleton is a repudiator because he insists that the five-twenty bonds should be paid in currency. They insist that all government bonds should be paid with gold. and not with "national engravings." and that the latter mode of payment is a virtual repudiation of a portion of the debt. "Tell it not in Gath; publish it not in the streets of Askalon," and yet it is a fixed and certain fact that th aforesaid Boutwell has at length discovered that the government thirty-year six per cent bonds (Pacific Railroad bonds) are payable in greenbacks. It will be borne in mind that the Secre tary has refused to recognize them as a portion of the national debt, not including them in any of his mouthly statements, as his predecessors uniformly did. This arbitrary ruling of a Secretary evoked the condemnation of certain New York journals, which called forth a response from the Philadelphia Press of October 27th, which it is stated was written by Mr. Boutwell's orders and is semi-officially acknowledged. In

it is statedare, as is learned officially, that Pacific Railroad bonds are not on the same footing as regular government bonds. them, it is true, but they only become un indebtedness of the United States when the Pacific Railroad companies shall fail to pay them. They are not as good a class of security for bank circulation as government bonds that are deposited by banks under the present rule of Se cretary Boutwell, because the latter are payable, principal and interest in gold whereas Pacific bonds and interest are payable in currency, which, at the present difference between gold and currency prices, makes the deposit for surety for circulation nearly one-third great ter than it would be if Pacific bonds were received."

Now it will be remembered that Sccretary Chase wrote an official letter when these bonds were first issued, in which he stated that "the currency sixes were a government bond the same as the five twenties and ten-forties," and if they are payable in currency, then also other United States bonds are, because these bonds are in form precisely the same as all other United States registered bonds, differing from them in not a single word, as the following copy will attest:
