"Pay ten dollar. down" China railroad scheme. He finally struck it, and explains the phenomenon in this wise :

Sam Clarke, George Woods, Elliott & Co., desired to " raise the wind," or, in other words to gull the people ou of a fabulous sum of money. They know the prevailing anxiety among the people for a railroad, and supposed they would rush trantically into the embraces of any Company that would " commence work." Knowing that there were few indeed in Oregon who could not raise ten dollars, the

"Pay ten dollars down" scheme was "improvised" in the hope of inducing ten or fifteen thousand persons in the State to invest, which several investments would aggregate the spug little sum of one hundred or one hundred and fifty thousand dollars ! This divided between the trio-Sam Clarke, Woods and Elliott-would constitute a " stake " each, worth the effort to get it, while the railroadwell-it would fail.

#### THE WOOLEN FACTORY.

The Willamette Woolen Mills wil not recommence regular work for at least a week to come. The repairs and improvements contemplated require more time than was anticipated at first; the waterwheel has to be taken up and new boxing prepared, as the old Babbit metal was very much worn. The fire engine will be entirely changed, by being placed on the penstock and made to run with gearing instead of belting. By this arrangement, there will be no water standing in the pump, and no danger of the water being frozen in it, as was the case when the dry house was burned last winter and in case of fire around the engine there would be no belting to be burned, so that the engine can work when surrounded by flames of this county. This drug store is well | There is to be a brick fire-proof boiler house constructed, with a draft chim ney 60 feet high, and steam-pipes leading from the boiler will warm the whole Factory in an agreeable and pleasant manner, heat the vats in the dye-house, and also warm the dryhouse, so there will be no fires kept on the premises elsewhere. Even common lights will soon be done away with, as the Company are entertaining a proposition to construct gas works, on the same plan as is in operation at the Mission Mills, San Francisco. The refuse and sweepings of the mill can be made use of to profit in the manufacture of gas to light the entire premises, and this, when in operation will do away with the necessity of having movable lights in use. Boiler-makers from Portland were here a few days since, repairing he flaws existing in the boiler.

When the Company complete their improvements, the mill will be thor. oughly prepared to do the best kind of work in the most economical manner .-Record. Monday, 22d.
