DALLAS LYCEUM.—On Friday evening, Oct. 30th, the Dallas Lyceum met at the appointed time and place. Mr. Crawford called the house to order. On motion of Capt. Lafollet, D. B. Turney was made Secretary Pro Tem until the regular election of officers.

The Report of the Committee on Constitution was read. After slight alterations and amendments a Constitution and By-Laws were adopted.

On motion of Mr. Collins, all who desired to sign the Constitution had an opportunity. A resolution was introduced and passed, that any lady may become a member of this society by putting her name to the Constitution, free of any initiation fee.

After the Constitution had been duly signed, the election of officers occurred, with the following result: President, J. W. Crawford; Vice President, Daniel B. Turney; Secretary, J. M. Grant; Treasurer, B. Robb.

After the members had paid their initiation fees to the Treasurer, the discussion of the Woman-Suffrage question was proceeded with. It was decided in the affirmative.

A resolution was adopted, instructing the Treasurer to purchase and procure all things necessary for the society in the way of fuel, light and stationery.

Some rules about the order of business, number of debaters, limitations of time, etc., were adopted.

It was voted that the following question be the subject of debate on Friday evening next:

"Resolved: That intemperance has done more harm to man than wars have done." Those who have not been appointed on debate are expected to favor the association with compositions, essays, original orations, declamations, select readings, or in any other literary way they choose.

MINISTERIAL CONVENTION.—On Tuesday last the preachers of the Portland District—or, several of them, at least—appeared in our quiet town. We believe they are styled the Portland District Association, and came for the purpose of holding a convention. They met as was agreed. The assembly was presided over by Rev. J. F. DeVore, P. E. The exercises were, as we have been told, suitable, interesting and commendable. The discussions were spirited, pertinent and evangelical. Everything, from first to last, harmonized; and those who witnessed the proceedings of the assembly were well pleased. Much good may result. We hope to have our little place favored frequently by such conventions. Among the subjects treated upon in the Convention, we may mention: "Providence," Divinity of Christ, Christian Perfection, Divine Call to the Ministry, Mode of Baptism, Salvation Conditional, "New Birth," Final Triumph of Christianity, Modern Versions of the Bible, Prayer, Sunday Schools, Evidences of Conversion, Immortality of the Soul, Future General Judgment, Infant Baptism, Resurrection of the Dead, Repentance, Value of Time, Church Fellowship, The Christian's Duty to God, Human Depravity, Instability, Temperance, and "Ministerial Success."

The preachers composing the Ministerial Convention, have requested us to publish the following in the Signal. On Oct. 29th the following resolution was unanimously adopted by the assembly before its adjournment: Resolved: That we, the members of the Ministerial Convention, tender to the people of Dallas our most hearty thanks for their kind reception and Christian hospitality during our stay among them.
