A Success .- Late in November last, a comparatively thin strata of grave! which was procured from the Rickreal, near town, was hauled out in wagons and "dumped" along the middle of Main street, in Dallas. It was supposed by many to be labor in vain; but such is not the case. The wheels of vehicles rumble over this track-high and drywhile all about is deep mud elsewhere. If so slight a sprinkling of gravel will effect so much, the same material put on our roads in considerable quantities would make them permanently good. Some of our leading citizens propose to aid in repeating the experiment in Dallas until our streets present a more creditable appearance than some of them do at present. We think that about treble the amount of gravel already deposited on Main street would put said street be yond the contingency of becoming difficult to "navigate" during the very worst seasons for mud in this country.

the county on Thursday, went to Hay ward's plantation on the Ogerothe river. eleven miles from this city, to arrest seventeen negroes, charged with shoot ing the watchmen on the plantation, and carrying off the crops They made five arrests on the Atlanta and Gulf railroad. They were surrounded by about one hundred armed negroes who rescued the prisoners, disarmed and robbed he Sheriff destroyed the warrants and then threatened to kill him if he ever served legal process again in that vicinity. The negroes then seperated into squads and marched back to the plant. ations, avowing that they would have the heart's blood of every white man or the Ogerothe river, saying that war had commenced. One negro watchman supposed to be murdered and two white men badly hurt. All the white men were obliged to flee to the city to save their lives. The women and children are in the hands of the mob and have been carried off into the woods. Great excitement exists in the community. A Sheriff's posse of between three and four handred citizens will leave at d y break to-morrow to rescue the women and children. The military decline to interfere until the power of the civil authorities for preserving order is ex SAVANNAH, Dec. 31.—The Ogeer-

hee troubles still continue. Middleton's house was burned last night. The crops are ruined and all the whites have come to this city The Sheriff, with his posse, went out this morning but made no arrests. A large force, fully armed, are determined to assi-t the authorities. All six of the roads leading from this city are picketed by negroes. A meeting was held to-day at the Court House, where affairs were discussed.

SAVANNAH, Jan. 2.—The troubles in Ogeechee continues, but nothing transpiring yesterday. The citizens are organizing to put down lawlessness.
