Lakeview Correspondence.

At the request of one of your subscribers, I will send you a line from this part of Eastern Oregon. I reside in Lakeview, a thriving little village town nestled close to the foot of high bald hills on the east side of the northern portion of Goose Lake valley. To the west of town lies a large tract of level land, of which a great portion is meadow land, where a mixture of wild grass grows, which answers the purpose of hay. Stock do much better on this wild hay than on tame hay. It seems to be the natural food for all kinds of stock. Even hogs will turn from their grain preferring the hay. Stock of all kind are looking unusually well, owing to the mild winter we are having. There has been considerable snow fall, but it did not lay on the ground long, and our cold snaps of weather only lasted a few days at a time. I learn by newspaper reports, that the snow has felt much deeper north of here, this winter, than it has at this place.

At the present time we are having beautiful spring weather. The farmers have commenced plowing. Some began to prophesy a dry season, but last night their prophecy was dampened by a nice spring shower. I hope it will continue to treat their wisdom in like manner, as a dry season here, means short crops.
