Ed. HERALD: I desire to say to your readers that I supported and voted for the amendment to the school law; and it was my understanding at the time, that it embraced one fifty dollar apportionment only, to each school district once each year. I also understood that this amount had been provided for by the legislature of 1882. This being the case the larger districts are not impaired financially, while the lesser school districts are benefited. The following note was received by me a few hours since from Hon. E. B. McElroy, superintendent public instruction, which will no doubt be read with interest:

Hon. J. H. Roberts—My dear sir: Your favor of the 16th inst. received. In reply I have to say that my opinion is that the amendment only contemplates one (1) apportionment per district each year, and this is to be done in April, and taken out of that apportionment only."
