Cleveland on the Chinese Question.

Washington, April 13.—Congressman Budd called upon the President to-day for the purpose of paying his respects prior to leaving for California. He called the President's attention to the Chinese question and the importance to the people of the Pacific Coast that all enactments of Congress should be properly carried out, and requested that the attention of Secretary Manning and the Attorney-General should be called to the law of 1884 and to the rulings of McCulloch, and that the regulations of McCulloch should be changed so as to conform with the intent of Congress.

The conference between the President and Budd was quite extended. Budd had refrained from calling on the President until the eve of his departure for home, as he has been attending to matters in the departments for his constituents, and recognizing the fact that the President was badly bored by importunities, he had no personal claims to present. His claims for the constituents he had made to the departments. The President questioned him quite closely in regard to California affairs in relation to parties, etc., on the Pacific Coast, and the visit which he expected to make, etc.

A Fine Deal For Russia. London, April 18.—Full 200 English vessels seeking cargoes of grain are now assembled at Odessa, Taganrog, and other parts of the Black sea and the sea of Azof. More Cruisers Being Made. Hongkong, April 18.—The British Government is chartering steamers belonging to the Peninsula and Oriental line, and transferring them into armed cruisers.

Results of the Rain.

The copious rain of last week will prove the greatest benefaction ever given to California, coming, as it did, after a dry spell of from sixty to ninety days, according to locality. It is not an exaggeration to assert that the yield of wheat will be increased by this rain to the extent of at least ten millions of cents, and other grains in proportion. Last year the total product of wheat in this State was about 34,500,000 cents, and it is likely to equal or exceed that figure this season.

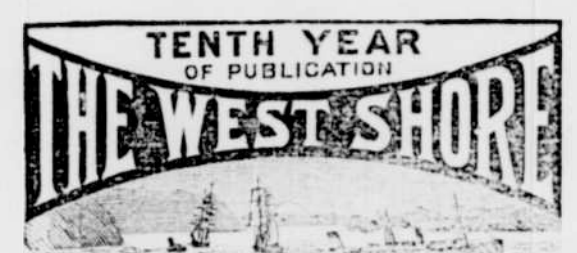

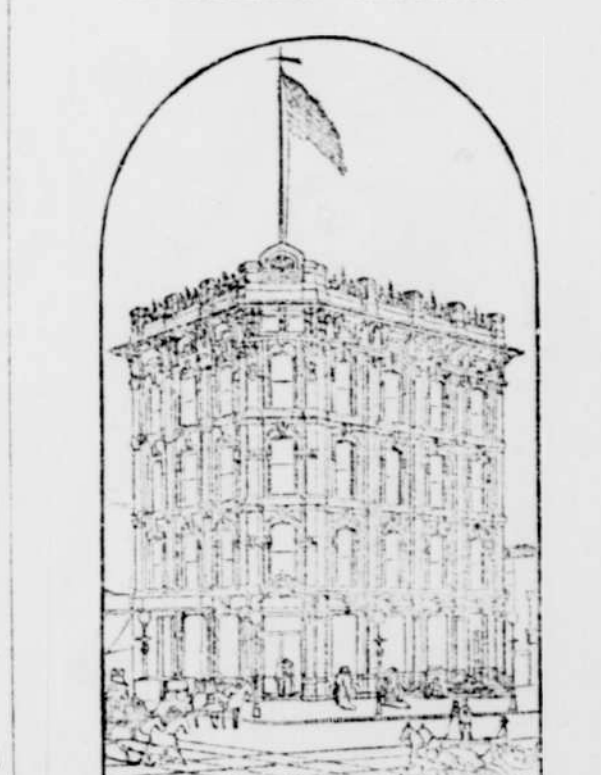

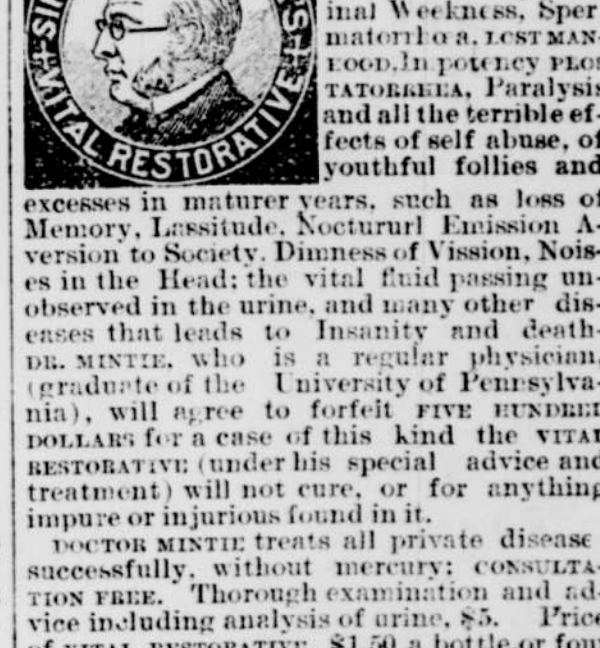
