Terrible Encounter With a California Lion.

The Appeal for a tough yarn: For some time past some animal of great size and strength has been killing Mr. Chas. McCown's calves, sheep and hogs. Thursday morning he took his dogs, four in number, and started to hunt the animal up. The night previous it had eaten up a fine Jersey cow valued at \$75. In a short time the dogs started the animal, and soon had it in a tree. Mr. McCown arriving at the spot, promptly discharged his Winchester at the animal. At the crack of the gun, the panther bounded from the tree, and in an instant succeeded in killing all four of the dogs, and then attacked the hunter. Being at such close quarters, of course, he could not use his gun to advantage, so unsheathing his trusty Bowie knife, he determined to kill the animal and avenge his faithful dogs, or die in the attempt. For a considerable time the conflict was uncertain, neither seeming to have the advantage, but locked in a deadly embrace they rolled over and over, down the mountain side for a distance of three-fourths of a mile, filling the air with dust and fragments of broken rock. At last, however, a well directed thrust from Mr. McC's Arkansas tooth-pick decided the fight in favor of the hunter. The death struggles of the animal, as described by Mr. McCown were frightful to behold, and in its expiring fury it tore up brush, saplings and trees from six to eight inches in diameter, mangling many of them into splinters. The conflict lasted nearly four hours. The animal Mr. McCown pronounced to be the genus (M. China) or California lion, and measured ten feet and fourteen inches from tip of nose to end of tail, and must have weighed nearly 700 lbs. At the close of this terrible fight Mr. McCown was entirely deprived of his clothing, except a paper collar and neck-tie, which miraculously to relate, were left intact.

Boys, the recklessness of youth is what has caused so many mothers' hair to turn as white as the driven snow. It is this that caused so many fathers and mothers to give up by the wayside and be laid in premature graves. The follies of our youth hang heavier upon the hearts of our fathers and mothers than the millstone that grinds the kernel into finest flour. It is a pity that so me of the young men of today didn't fall in between the millstones before they had caused the trouble they have.—Ex.

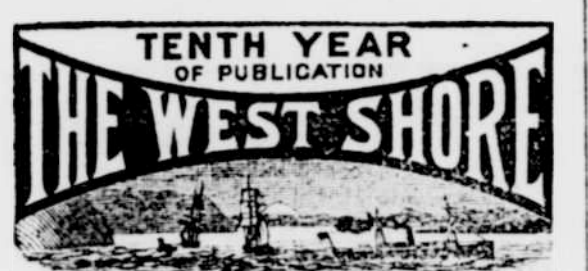

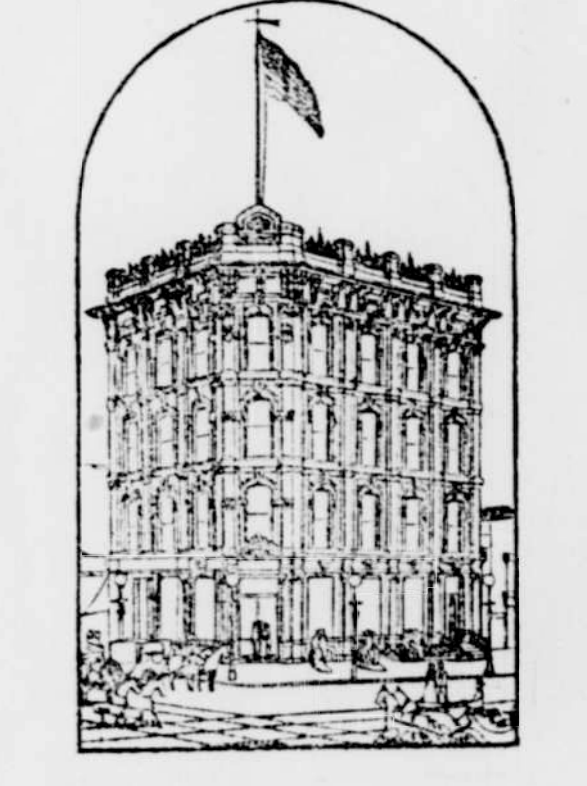
