**BANDON.**

We have crowds of tourists heretofore. No less than 47 landed at Port Bandon from one of our river steamers on Friday last, in addition to those that came down the Coquille in boats, all bound for the varied attractions of the Bandon beach. After scouring the gravel beds for rubies and agates, the wanderers invariably visit the Cathedral rock, and in its sombre, solemn caves, perhaps sit down and meditate over the past or endeavor to peep into the great mystery of the future. Or perhaps they may pass through the Silver arch, of which an Indian tradition says, that if an unmarried man and woman pass under it three times in one day, they will be married before the next moon, or they may inspect the Bride's Chamber where the Indian matron in former days, used to instruct her new daughter-in-law in the duties appertaining to her new position. Amongst the visitors were some old friends from the bay, all of whom called to see us, and with whom we spent some pleasant hours. They and their parents are amongst our oldest friends in this country, and we had much pleasure in reviving a friendship that has been interrupted during an interval of several years.

Our active and energetic representative, the Hon. Binger Hermann is working hard for a daily mail from Roseburg down the Coquille to Bandon. We have every reason to hope he will succeed. Our saw mills fisheries and other commercial enterprise now require daily communications with the outside world.

A memorial to congress will soon be in circulation for \$100,000 to complete the present south wall out to deep water. This is a necessity that cannot be dispensed with, although vessels go in and out now fairly enough, yet until the wall is completed as recommended in the government survey report, a bar may form at any time and everything be reduced to the miserable state we were in before the jetty was commenced. Let us all then sign it, and prove by our number and earnestness that this important work must be attended to.

Charley Von Pegert is driving piles for the erection of a wharf for the shipping of lumber from Mr. Persbaker's new saw mill on the lower Coquille.

Several shafts have been sunk in the neighborhood of the present black sand mines at Randolph, some to a depth of sixty feet and several beds of gold bearing sand have been found. Everything is very satisfactory and our patentees are in high glee.

A gentleman from Douglas county who was here about 3 years ago tells us he was so pleased with Floras creek butter, that neither he, nor his family have since used any other. Another gentleman from the same county lately ordered a years supply from the same locality, and there would probably spring up a good trade if there were facilities for forwarding it. At present it must go to Roseburg by the same conveyance that carries the mails, and this raises the cost of transit considerably.

About two weeks ago W. T. Wright, our ex-county treasurer, and James Brown, accompanied by a party of six from California, went down the Coquille country among the high mountains of the coast range on a hunting and fishing expedition, which has turned out very profitable. They killed any amount of elk and deer during their stay. W. T. Wright and James Brown returned home last Tuesday, while their California friends returned to their homes by steamer from Coos Bay. They brought lots of jerked elk out of the mountains with them.—Plaindealer.

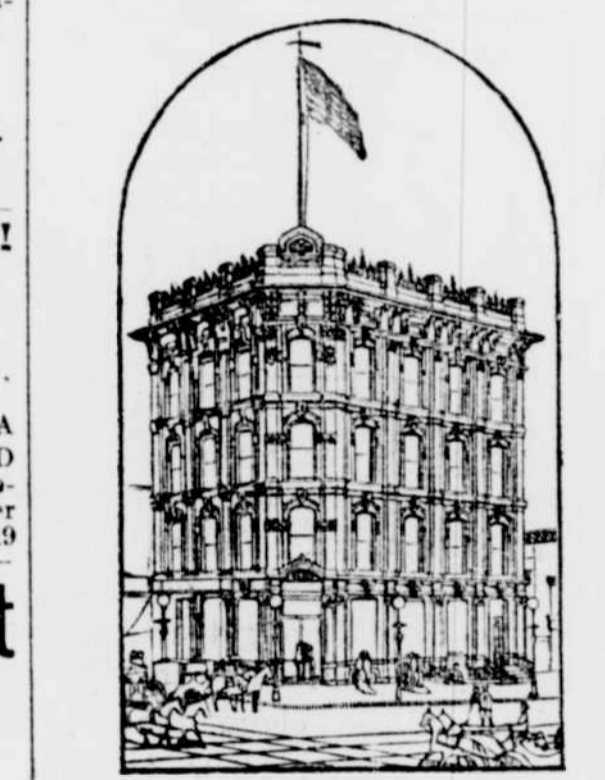

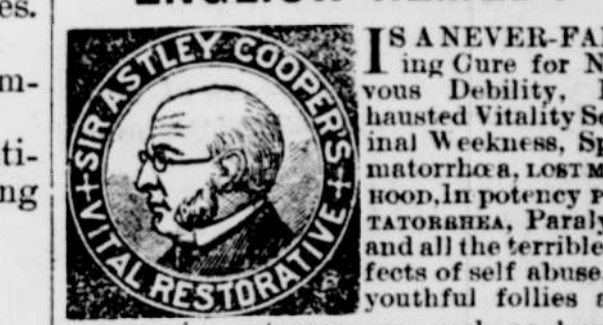
