Apaches Killed six Men.

Santa Fe, N. M., Sept. 17.—During the last ten days Apaches have murdered six citizens of Grant county—Rancher Brady Pollock, near El Eacho; Evarsto Abeyta, a Mexican, near San Lorenzo; two sons of John McKennon, on a ranch near Gallino creek; George Horn, a woodchopper near Georgetown, and a Mexican sheep herder, near Lake Valley, name unknown. They have also destroyed McKnight & Kerth's ranch house near Lake Valley.

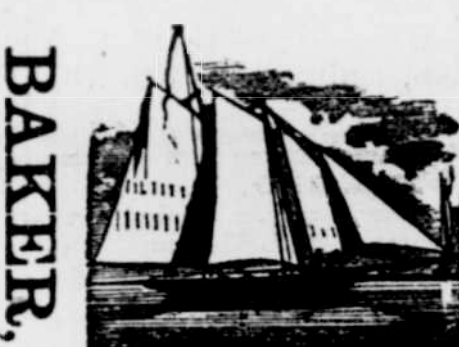
