BANDON.
 At the Methodist conference lately held at Albany, Oregon, all that part of the country including Port Bandon, Bandon City, Floras creek, etc., is set apart as a separate charge, and named the Bandon circuit. The order was signed by the presiding bishop, R. K. Hargrove, Methodist Episcopal church South, and countersigned by the Rev. E. G. Michael, presiding elder. The Rev. H. B. Swafford who has resided on the upper Coquille for some years, and who is well known and appreciated as a zealous and efficient minister, has been appointed to take charge. Messrs. Alberson & Averill have granted a site for the erection of the church, parsonage, and school house. This is situated on the rising ground west of the town, and on the road leading to Bandon City, and have in addition come forward, and offered to contribute liberally toward their erection.

The Signal Service officer for the U. S.—volunteer observer—at Bandon has lately been appointed to the same office for the "Division of the Pacific". He must take the temperature three times daily, rainfall in inches and decimals, and observations of various kinds, and he has done the same for the Transcontinental Survey, for some time. Although he appreciates the compliments which these departments have paid him from time to time, yet he would appreciate them even still more, if there was any coin of the realm diffused through them, but which unfortunately there is not. According to the monthly weather review published at Washington for the month of July—the last published—the lowest monthly mean temperature was at Bandon, the monthly mean here, being 56.8, save at a place called Braddock in Colorado, where it was only 51.9. This was owing to the minimum temperature there, which was as low as 23, ie 9 degrees below the freezing point. Here our minimum was 45, or thirteen above the freezing point. In Braddock the difference between the extremes was 62, Albany Oregon, 42, West Point, New York, 50, College City California, 58, Bayne, Michigan 68. Here in Bandon it was only 28. We have probably as equal a temperature all the year through as can be found anywhere.

Several business lots have lately been engaged at Port Bandon. Mr. Caldwell is going to build a drug-store, and carry on other kinds of business also. Dyer Leneve is going to open a book store, and stationary establishment. Mr. Walden from Ellensburg is going to supply liquid nourishment to weary and thirsty travelers, and others are going to engage in various occupations that are now necessary in order to supply the ordinary requirements of a civilized community. Jack and Bob Beatty have nearly completed the tunnel that they are boring, in order to supply water for the sash and floor factory that will shortly be erected here. They are both hard-working, honest fellows, and deserve every credit for the perseverance and energy they have shown in what we may almost call the completion of this tiresome, and dangerous work.

The salmon fishing is very good this season. Alfred Machado caught 500 in one haul. Simpson brothers caught 1200 in one days operations. In fact such was the enormous catch last week, that the cannery was unable to work off its receipts, and several of their boats were obliged to suspend operations for the present.

A Fearful Cyclone.
 Calcutta, Sept. 25.—A fearful cyclone has visited Falve Points, a port on the Bay of Bengal. Telegraph lines have been swept away, and probably many vessels have been wrecked on the bay. A government steamer has gone to render any assistance that may be needed.

Americans stand poor chances of holding their own in Mexico, as is evidenced by the taking of the Las Cruces silver mines by Mexicans, from its American owners. That the said owners were driven away by regular Spanish troops, must be humiliating to our proud government.

Some of the miners who have lately worked in the Henryville mine, and who have heretofore mined at various places on this coast, inform us that the coal in the above mine is equal to the best, and superior to most of the coal dug on the Pacific coast. The vein of coal now opened is nearly six feet thick, clear of dirt and sulphur, and is excellent for steam as well as domestic purposes. We hope this valuable property will not long remain idle.—Coos Bay News.

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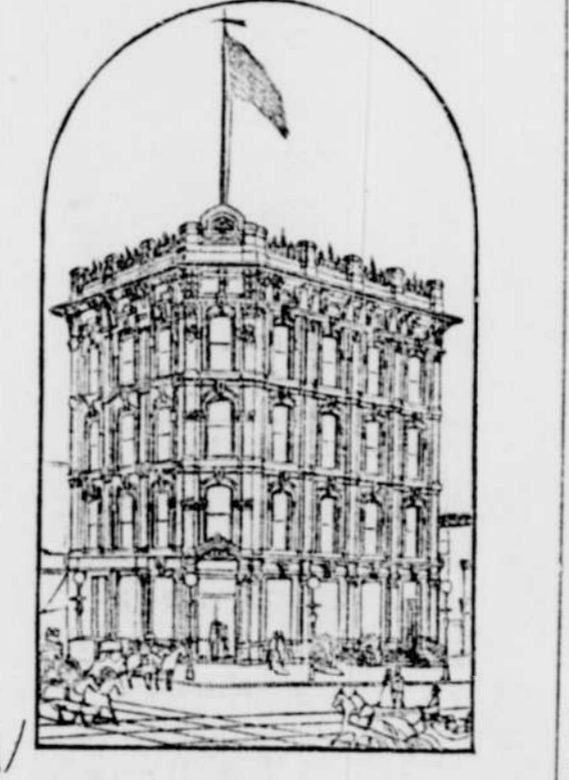
