Roseburg Correspondence.
Roseburg, Oct. 16th, 1885. Ed. Herald:—My remarks in a former communication in regard to the dry and intensely hot weather appeared to have had the desired effect; the sky was overcast the next day and we had a nice gentle rain, and it has been cool and pleasant ever since, but just how long it will remain so "deponent saith not." It is well enough to throw out a hint occasionally and cause a change in the regularity of those proceedings.

The cry here is dull times and no money. Roseburg is visited with more fog during the fall and winter months than any place of its size on the globe.
Circuit court convenes here next week—3rd Monday. The docket is quite large. There are only five divorces.

Rev. McAllister, of Corvallis, delivered an able and interesting lecture last Monday evening at the Presbyterian church to a large and appreciative audience. His subject was "Universalism—Is it True or False?"

Your correspondent visited the public school in this place last Tuesday, and was very much pleased with the deportment and recitations of the pupils. The school is progressing splendidly under the supervision of Prof. J. B. Horner. He is an affable and pleasant gentleman, and as a teacher, is master of the situation. He has no superior in the state, and Roseburg is indeed fortunate in securing his valuable services. We were shown through the different departments where every thing seemed to work like magic—not a jar nor discord.

Mr. Horner's wife is his first assistant, and is a successful teacher of considerable experience. Miss Lucy Hay, and Miss W. Mosher, are worthy and efficient teachers, and consequently the school is sure to be a success. The children all march in and out to the tap of the drum. Mr. H. said that he could get them in and out much quicker in that way than he could by the old style of go-as-you-please, helter skelter, and it also taught them to step.

Mr. Horner's room is furnished with a piano, maps, pictures and a library. There were 276 pupils present, and only two, I believe, absent. The incense in connection with the school is quite an auxiliary, and all the members take a great interest in it.

The "Reform Club" gives an entertainment at the Grange hall every Tuesday evening. Last Tuesday their play was "Ten Nights in a Bar Room." Mr. H. noticed the familiar countenance of Lincoln Wright, (formerly of your county) on the stage. Lincoln has joined the order, and is an actor of no little merit. The theatrical performance was followed by a temperance address delivered by Rev. I. P. Moses.

The "Yankee Doodle Band" is arranging an elaborate programme for an entertainment here in the near future.

Roseburg at present is infested with tramps and horse-breakers. Last Wednesday evening one was found dead about a quarter of a mile north of town close to the railroad. It appears that four or five had been encamped three or four days where the body was found, and about eight o'clock Wednesday evening a tramp informed the night-watch that there was a dead man just above town. He immediately repaired to the place with the tramp and a number of our citizens, but before arriving at the camp they were joined by three tramps. The body was that of a very large man, apparently thirty or thirty-five years of age. He had been shot through the head, but two or three hours (it is presumed) before the party arrived at the spot, as the body was not entirely cold. The ball, seemingly of thirty-two calibre, entered the left side of his face just below the cheek bone and ranged downward—his neck was also broken. The tramp who escorted the party to the place where the body lay, has been arrested, and also the three others who joined the party, and four or five more who have been caught in town since. Hundreds visited the body of the unknown at the court house Thursday. It is supposed that he was killed by one of his fellow tramps, and that they have the murderer among the number incarcerated. The murdered man was seen in town Tuesday and had money on his person, and it is presumed he was killed in a drunken row at the camp, or for his money. Monday night tramps attempted to break into the residence of Mr. Hale, and Tuesday night they broke into the brewery, and tried to enter the dwelling of Mr. John England. Mr. E. heard them working at his door, and declared that he would sink them with lead, and in their haste to get away forgot their socks and boots. Mr. East lost all the beer they could hold and one or two pairs of boots. Mr. England missed some apples he had stored in his woodshed. Now, as you are in the midst of your salmon harvest, would it not be a good idea for us to send you down a few tramps. You could feed them on salmon and crabs—Crabs and salmon cost money here.

LUNA—Since writing my letter, I have learned that F. P. Hogan, Wells Fargo's detective, and a former sheriff of this county has made one of the tramps squeal, and, in his cell, the tramp admitted all the facts; he saw the shooting, and he says that the tramp who did the shooting left last night in company with another, and a report is afloat on the street that they were both arrested at Riddle to-day. The investigation before a coroner's jury is now going on with closed doors, and the tramp who divulged the matter to Hogan is now giving his testimony before the jury. This tramp was not arrested until this morning. Much excitement prevails in our town—it is the first murder that has occurred here for years.

Fifty teams have passed through town within the last week, bound south. The retail market here is as follows at present: Flour, \$3.75 per barrel; wheat, 50 cts per bushel; barley, 35 cts per bushel; hay, wheat or

timothy \$8 per ton; butter 25c per lb and scarce; eggs, 25 cts per doz; potatoes, 40 cts per bushel; hard 8 cts per bushel; dried apples, 5 cts per bushel; plums, 10 cts per bushel; chickens, \$2 @ 2.50 per doz.
If the weather remains cool I will try and furnish you with copy from week to week and I expect that the copy will be weak.
