Several more miners for Henryville arrived on the Coos Bay.

The schooner Jennie Thelin is taken a cargo of lumber at Empire. Alex Lang sold his ranch on Hayes slough last week to Peter Peterson of Newport, for \$1,900.

Pete Scott closed down his fishery at the forks of Coos river last week. His season's catch amounted to something over 400 barrels.

A wagon loaded with butter and other farm produce arrived in town Sunday from the Upper Coquille. Lando & Sons purchased the entire load, and the farmer laid in his winter supplies and departed. Next season the bay market will be much availed of by the Coquille farmers, and both sections of the county will be benefited thereby.

The fishermen at Centerville averaged about 100 barrels to the boat this season.

An Appeal to Cleveland.

Tucson, Oct. 23.—At a meeting of the bar this morning a dispatch was forwarded to President Cleveland, asking that the suspension of Judge Fitzgerald be recalled, on the ground that the change would at this particular time cause great confusion in court. If the suspension is not recalled they ask that it may not go into effect until January.

The Marquis of Lorne Rotten-Egged.

London, Oct. 24.—While delivering a campaign speech to-day, seven miles from London, the Marquis of Lorne was rotten-egged and ran in consternation. Mobs are now expected to occur frequently.

Crusade Against Chinatown.

Stockton, Oct. 22.—A meeting of 300 citizens this evening, presided over by Supervisor Inglis, adopted resolutions for the removal of Chinatown from the city limits, and containing a pledge to vote against all nominees at the city election November 3rd, not pledged for the removal of Chinatown. The movement includes some of the best citizens, and permanent organizations will be maintained.

Death of Mrs. Booth.

New York Oct. 23.—[special.]—Martha Agnes Booth widow of Junius Brutus Booth and mother of Edwin, John Wilkes and Junius Booth, died here yesterday of pneumonia, aged eighty-three. She will be buried at Baltimore. Mrs. Booth was widely known in theatrical circles and much loved.

About \$8,000 were paid out to the miners on Saturday at the Black Diamond mines for the past month's wages. There are about 300 men employed in and about the mines. That the camp is rapidly growing and exceedingly prosperous cannot be doubted. Three months ago the only store in the place was a little log cabin about 15 by 20 feet. To-day, the general store of Messrs. McLaughlin, Jones & Co. covers four times that area and would be a credit to this city in the stock carried and in its arrangement.—Seattle Chronicle.

The recent order to clear the Umatilla Indian reservation of white settlers, will break up many a fine farm if carried out. A large number of men with their half and three-quarter breed wives, took up ranches under the severalty act. Many have made costly improvements, and now comes the order for them to vamoose. Hank Vaughn, who has about 1,600 acres fenced and improved comes under the order. Hank Vaughn's farm yielded 50,000 bushels of wheat this season.—Ex.

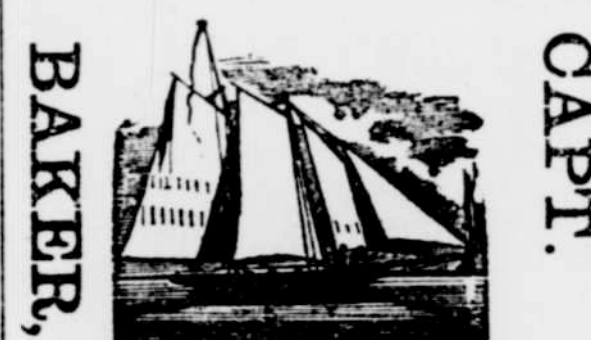
