Letter from Eld. Holtenbeck.

Eld. HERALD:—After some delay shall write you again. Sickness has prevented me from doing so before. I was first sick on the 8th, and though I only kept my bed one day, I have not fully recovered yet. I was advised that I was afflicted with scarlet fever which I doubted as I had not been exposed to that disease. The next of my family to contract the disease was Belle, next to the baby; and she was only sick a few days. My wife was next, and for seven days and nights she neither slept nor ate. She is now up, but very weak, and her friends would scarcely know her. Five days after Mrs. H. was taken sick, the baby became violently sick, with every symptom of malignant scarlet fever. She is better now, but for several days her recovery was despaired of. Effa and Bennie have complained some, but Johnnie has been well all the time. There have been three deaths from this disease with which my family has been afflicted, two of them being children of Sam and Ella Rocks. We mention their names as they have relatives and friends on the Coquille. Their eldest girl died on Tuesday and the little boy on the following Monday. Their other child is recovering. The parents are not as those without hope, both being Christians.

The third Sunday in this month we were present at the dedication of the Christian church at Barrettville. They have a very nice little church which is free from debt. We did not learn how much it cost, but suppose it must have cost \$1000. D. W. Gilbert is the pastor, and is well liked everywhere in the valley. I have preached every Sunday since my arrival here, but only filled one appointment of my own. The people turn out well to preaching here, there being from 75 to 125 present at every meeting.
