

BANDON.

Several ladies, including Mrs Hacker, Mrs Lamb, Mrs Lund, Mrs Wilson and Mrs Loury Watson, have kindly undertaken to collect subscriptions on Coos bay for the erection of the Methodist Episcopal church (South) and parsonage, about to be built at Bandon. These ladies, and we deem it only necessary to mention their names in order to convince every one who has the pleasure of their acquaintance, that everything which intelligence can suggest, or which energy can accomplish will be done by them in order to perfect the good work which they have so generously undertaken, are to be congratulated for the interest they have taken in our behalf. They, as well as many others, are beginning to look to the Bandon beach as their future summer resort, particularly that facile means of communication between Coos bay and the Coquille river are now within reach, and it is but natural that they should desire a temple to worship the God of Nature in, among the wonderful works of Nature's God. It is intended that the new church will be open to all christian denominations at an hour selected by themselves, and approved of by the local committee. Our local committee consists of Messrs. Averill, Andrew Johnson, Lamont, Caldwell and Bennett. Mr. Andrew Johnson, the treasurer, will gladly receive all the subscriptions, and Mr. Bennett will do all that he can to further the good cause.

Beaver slough has of late been greatly improved. The overhanging brush which formerly endeavored to brush, not only all the hair off our heads, including the scalp itself, and even the clothes off our back, but also the very boots off our feet, is gone forever. We missed all the logs save the widow's log, which is there still and as stout as ever. The slough is also widened considerably. It would not take much more labor now to relegate the difficulties of Beaver slough to history. If a straight channel were cut about a quarter of a mile to the west of the landing at Coaledo, the tortuous twists that now exist there would be avoided; and if the channel dug out by Mr. Dunham, at his own expense, from Coaledo landing to the shed from whence the cars start for Uter City was sufficiently widened and deepened, the little steamer about to be placed on the slough, would then be able to deliver her passengers at the shed, and all passengers then would have to do would be to step from the boat into the cars, and then the traveler on the entire passage from Myrtle Point at one end of the river, and at Bandon on the other, would be under cover all the way to Empire City. Several people have offered to subscribe for this purpose, but when all will be benefited the county ought to come forward, and we are confident there is not a rate-payer in the whole of Coos will object to the few extra mills it will add to his tax in order to attain to such an easy and advantageous communication as will then exist between the coast and lower river, and the upper river, and its numerous tributaries on this side, and the lively towns on Coos bay on the other. The cars on the railway are nicely fitted out, the floors are carpeted, the seats are cushioned, and you can sit down and enjoy your newspaper as comfortably as if you were by your own fireside. The conveyances on the slough are also good as could be expected under the circumstances. The "Mud Lark" has been over hauled, calked, and painted, and during our trip from Coaledo down to the Coquille she made the entire passage in one hour, fourteen minutes and three seconds. We are

sorry to hear that our old friend Capt Grandy who commanded the "Mud Lark" for several years during which time he saw much active service, and sailed through more mud, water-logs and water-rats than any other man in the United States, has retired to private life but we hope he'll change his mind and be on deck again.

We had a good smart storm on Tuesday last. It lasted from about one P. M. until about four P. M. during which time the thermometer fell from 60 to 51 degrees.

Riel's Execution Denounced.

Montreal, Nov. 20.—At a Riel meeting at Champ de Mars last night, Chairman M. O. David, after condemning the government's trial of Riel to never forgive those who were responsible for his death and also to adopt his children as those of the nation. Hon. M. Mercier protested solemnly against the fate of Riel, and called on the people to turn out the three cowards in the cabinet. George Duhamel, conservative, said Riel was a sublime fool and would soon have been forgotten if incarcerated in the penitentiary or a lunatic asylum. Instead of that he had descended to the grave, or rather had mounted the pedestal of immortality.

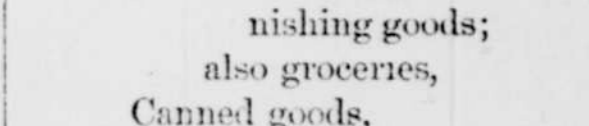
