The Great Storm.

New York, Nov. 26.—From different parts of the city, and from towns and villages in the track of the great storm of Tuesday, reports continue to come of destruction wrought. Although individual losses are large in only a few instances, yet the injury done by wind and floods is so widespread that the aggregate losses are very great, indeed. The damage at Long Branch and along the New Jersey coast is greater than at first reported. Several cottages suffered more or less, and the grounds of many others are sadly torn up. Water in the cellars still bothers people in streets near the river front, and trouble is experienced at many of the ferries, owing to the fact that high tides raised the bridges far out of level. In the lowlands west of Jersey City some of the railroads were still further damaged by floods.

Signs of Better Times.

Pittsburg, Nov. 26.—Wrought iron pipe makers, steel rail makers and makers of Bessemer pig iron are crowded with business. Prices as a rule are very firm, steel rails being quoted at \$33@35. Nail makers report a steady increase in the number of machines at work. Important developments are looked for in a few days. The general iron trade holds its own; great activity in coal mining is at hand; nearly every glass factory is crowded with orders, and a multitude of smaller industrial establishments busy.

COOS BAY RAILROAD AGAIN:—The inexhaustible resources in Douglas and Coos counties of coal, lumber gold, mines, grass, and with proper attention, vegetables, fruits, dairy products, and other industries, make an argument to capitalists, to come and build a railroad which is unanswerable. It would be of incalculable benefit to all concerned, to build a line from Roseburg to Coos Bay and Port Orford. A route has been already surveyed, and found to be practicable, and a road could be constructed at a very reasonable cost, in comparison with many roads built in the west. This would open up in all this vast territory in Southern Oregon a means of transportation which would be remunerative and expeditious. Benton county is now enjoying the value of a competitive road to the amount of 6 cents per bushel more for wheat than is given by any other route. Then let us have a railroad to the coast from Roseburg.—Roseburg Review.
