**Chinese Becoming Citizens.**  
 San Francisco, Dec. 18.—Chronicle's El Paso, Texas: Chinese located in El Paso are taking out naturalization papers, and intend to become permanent citizens. Eight were made citizens to-day. It is thought the whole local colony, numbering over 200, will secure papers. Leading Chinese in the city state that the movement will become general, and their countrymen in all cities and towns in the southwest will speedily renounce their allegiance to China and become American voters.

**Great Scheme Afloat.**

Montreal, Dec. 18.—[Special.]—The Canadian Pacific will complete its immense telegraph system early in the new year and open it to the public in the spring. It is now in correspondence with the Baltimore and Ohio with a view of securing American connection, now unbroken, from Montreal to the Pacific, 28,095 miles. There are now erected for commercial uses two heavy No. 6 wires from Montreal to Winnipeg by the Canadian Pacific. It is 1450 miles from Winnipeg to British Columbia, and additional facilities will be provided. When completed Halifax will have inter-oceanic connection with the projected imperial cable of Great Britain. Soundings have already been taken from British Columbia to Japan, and the estimated cost of the Pacific cable will be three million three hundred thousand dollars.

**A Noble Institution.**

Daily Standard: The labor bureau is thriving wonderfully and is each day extending the sphere of its usefulness. The work of this institution is of incalculable value to the city, as it relieves it in a great many instances from the necessity of furnishing either labor or food for many a poor fellow who is out of employment with empty pockets and a stomach in the same condition. All classes of working people call around now to the bureau and put in their appeal for work. Superintendent Montgomery says that he can furnish men for nearly all classes of work,—engineers, mechanics, carpenters and other trades. The benefits of the bureau are not exclusively for men, but ladies in need of positions also call around and generally work can be found for them without delay. Yesterday a gentleman from East Portland came to the office while the reporter was there and asked for a girl to do general housework. The superintendent took his name and afterwards sent over an applicant for the place. Such instances are numerous, and it shows what good is being accomplished by the bureau.

**Indian Uprising Threatened.**

Missoula, M. T., Dec. 17.—Last night about 11 o'clock two Indians came to the store of V. H. Coombes, at Arlee, on the Flathead reservation, and insisted on his letting them in, and threatened to break down the door if he did not. He let them in and after making a small purchase they demanded a gun, which one of them had left there a short time before for surety for some goods. Coombes refused to give up the gun, when one Indian drew a knife and revolver, and advanced on Coombes, the other Indian standing in the door. Coombes put out the candle, and retreated outside, pushing the Indian at the door away. Getting outside he called to Bader, keeper of the hotel next door, and Bader came out with a shot gun. The Indian with the knife and pistol advanced on Bader, but the latter caught him by the pistol hand. The Indian was then on the point of stabbing Bader in the breast, when Coombes fired and shot the Indian through the head, killing him instantly. The other Indian then fired at the men and ran. Bader fired at him, and it is thought hit him, and he gave a couple of yells, and his gun and blanket were found near by this morning.

The Indian who escaped is a Flathead known as Big Jim, and is said to have killed seven or eight men.

The dead Indian is unknown, and is thought to have come from the Colville country.

Indians on the reservation were gathering in a considerable number this afternoon, and Col. Gibson, commanding at Fort Missoula, was called on for troops, and he ordered a detachment of the Third Infantry, under command of Major Jordan, to proceed to Arlee by special train this evening, but later reports were more favorable, and the order was countermanded as the troops were on board the cars and about to start.

Sheriff Lane returned from Arlee this evening and reports arresting Big Jim, who had a charge of birdshot in his rear, but the Indians took him away from him. Sheriff Lane also reports the dead Indian to be a son of Chief Partie, of the Flathead tribe.

**A Hospitable Peasant.**

About three hundred years ago there was a Czar or Emperor of Russia named Ivan which, you know, is the Russian for John. He was very fond of traveling about in different disguises, that he might hear what the people thought of him.

One day he was at a small village near Moscow. He was dressed like a beggar, and pretended to be tired and hungry. But although he asked for food and shelter at several cottages no one would take any notice of him—he was too shabby and poor. Just as he was going to leave the village he saw a miserable hut, at which he begged for a night's lodging. The peasant took him by the hand and led him in, saying he had come at a bad time, his wife was ill, but he was welcome to such food and shelter as they had to offer.

There were five children in the little cottage, and also a tiny baby only lately born. The Czar took this one in his arms, and on the next morning when he was leaving the cottage, he asked the hospitable peasant not to have him christened for three hours.
