Local Lacoties.

Coos bay is afflicted with chick-en-pox.

The Odd Fellows of Marshfield contemplate building a hall soon.

If you fail to register you disfranchise yourself. Remember this.

Will Benham is going to move back to this place in April, from Camas Valley.

A new vessel will be commenced at North Bend soon, the other having been launched a week ago.

Tom Coates writes that he is coming back here this spring. He doesn't like Washington territory.

We are in receipt of Capt. C. F. Powell's annual report on harbor and river improvements in the northwest.

Mr. J. W. Lamb, of Catching creek, called on us Thursday. John is logging occasionally and we trust is doing well.

Twelve hundred calves recently bought up in this section of country are being taken to Eastern Oregon and Washington territory.

The entertainment at Marshfield for the benefit of the race track is pronounced a success, and we presume the track will be hurried to completion.

Jesse Norton is to have the training of Young Rifleman, Levar & Sherwood's horse, which is equivalent to saying that he will run for all there is in him. He will be at the Halls prairie fair this fall.

A duck in this state laid 222 eggs, five of which weigh one pound, and this all inside of one year, and besides raised a brood of 16 young ducks. It is singular that ducks are not kept more by the farmers and ranchers.

Railroad fare has been reduced so a person can go back to the states for a song. From Los Angeles to Omaha it is but \$1 and \$4 from San Francisco to Chicago. There is an immense amount of travel at the present time.

The steamer Arcata lost the sleeve from her propeller shaft, and she had to be towed into the bay by a tug. She was taken in tow, after loading, by the Arago, which happened to be ready to sail at the time and taken to San Francisco.

Mr. Wash Bullard left a sample of the finest licorice root we have ever seen with us last week. From one bunch of it, 60 feet of root as large as a man's finger was obtained. There is a fortune awaiting some one who will cultivate licorice in the Coquille valley.

Mr. Joseph Whitsell called on us Wednesday while he was en route to Empire City to make final proof on his pre-emption. Mr. W. has been here only eight months and has cleared 80 acres of his place and will finish the whole tract this spring. He has a fine farm in California and will go there occasionally to see after it, but will make this country his home.

Young Rifleman, belonging to Levar & Sherwood at Sumner, is the coming racer it is thought. Some have tried to ruin the horse's pedigree by asserting that they saw Old Rifleman in California in 1852, and therefore it would be impossible for Young Rifleman to be one of his colts. Their ignorance is apparent when it is known that Old Rifleman was sired in Kentucky in 1855.

Mr. G. B. Self who has been living one mile south of this town for several years, and who is one of our best citizens left Friday for Nevada, having rented his place here to Mr. Tension. Mr. S. goes to join his wife who is quite feeble. He has an offer by an intimate friend—a show to make a fortune and we hope Green will make it, and that his good lady may soon regain her health.

J. W. Van Brocklin and W. R. Forrest of Seattle, W. T., who arrived by the last Arcata, came up to inspect the black sand mines near Randolph, for which place they started Monday morning.

John Switzer of San Francisco returned to the bay by the Arago last Sunday and Monday morning he started to Port Blacklock, near Port Orford, where he is interesting himself in an extensive quarry of valuable building stone.

Switzer was accompanied by W. M. Butler, and they had with them a surveyor's outfit. It is stated that a dock will at once be built at Port Blacklock and all other necessary arrangements made for shipping the above mentioned stone to San Francisco this summer.

The brig Orient, Capt. A. E. Small, arrived at North Bend last Thursday, where she is now being transformed into a two-masted schooner. When this has been accomplished the Orient will be the largest two-masted schooner on the coast and capable of carrying 375,000 feet of lumber.

She was built down in Maine over 20 years ago, but of white oak, and is to-day as sound as a dollar. This is Capt. Small's first trip on this coast as master of a vessel. Prior to taking charge of the Orient he was captain of the steamer Restless running on the Umpqua, between Gardiner and Scottsburg. Fred Seymour formerly engineer, is now captain of the Restless.

A large crowd went to North Bend last Saturday afternoon to witness the successful launching of the new four-masted schooner, which slid into the bay between 4 and 5 o'clock as slick as grease could make her go, and she looked very pretty as she rode the water and was brought up with a round turn by a line from the tug Escort.

Her dimensions are: Keel, 152 feet; over all, 166 feet; beam, 40 feet; hold, 16 feet. She has ports fore and aft and is calculated to carry 800,000 feet of lumber on a draught of 16 feet. Her four masts will be single and 105 feet in length.

Remedy for Ear-ache.

A Spanish physician recommends for ear-ache a liniment composed of camphorated chloral, two and a half parts, and oil of sweet almonds, ten parts. This is to be well mixed and preserved in a well corked bottle. A pledget of very soft cotton is to be soaked in the liniment, and then introduced as far as possible into the affected ear, two applications being made daily. Frictions may also be made each day, with the preparation behind the ear. It is claimed that the pain is almost immediately relieved, and in many cases even the inflammation is subdued.—Ex.

The fact that Curry county cannot gain population till she has roads, and cannot have roads till she gets more population (as portrayed last week by our Ellensburg correspondent), reminds one of the action of the Oregon legislature when that august body passed an act that the highest rate of interest allowed in the state should not exceed 10 per cent, which it claimed was a fine stroke of economy. It has had the effect to drive the money out of the state without the circulation of which one could hardly find profitable investment for money at the low rates prevailing.

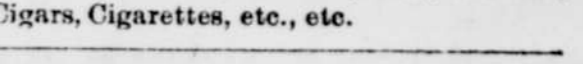
