Crop Reports.

Springfield, O., April 16.—The Champion harvester works publishes reports on the wheat crop received from its agent: all over the country. The following is their estimate of the product in 1886, based upon the 731 crop reports received from the six leading winter states: Indiana, average bushels per acre, 12; total, 33,000,000; Ohio, average bushels per acre, 12, total, 29,600,000; Pennsylvania, average bushels per acre, 5, total, 26,800,000; Missouri, average bushels per acre, 11, total, 28,400,000; New York, average bushels per acre, 11, total, 22,300,000. The crop of 1882 was 518,000,000 bushels, which was the largest ever known. The crop of 1886 can be fairly estimated at 550,000,000 bushels.

Eastern Oregon Mines.

Prospectors are already entering the Granite Creek country and making several locations of quartz discoveries. Mr. Chas. S. Miller of monumental fame, arrived in our city last Sunday from the Granite Creek mining district and reports having re-located a valuable discovery of quartz on Greenhorn mountain, six miles west of Robinsonville. He intends returning to his claim in a few days and will put a couple of men to work at once developing. Mr. Miller is a mining man of experience and his judgment of mines is seldom wrong, and from the way the gentleman speaks of his discovery and the Granite country in general, we are lead to believe that there is a great future in store for this portion of our country.

A gentleman by the name of Boyd, formerly of Wood River, made several locations on this mountain, one of them an extension of the Miller claim, and is pushing the work of development as fast as possible. Mr. Boyd is the possessor of milling machinery in the Wood River country and it is his intention at the present time to have the same shipped from there and placed on one of the ledges.

Placer mining has started up this spring under very favorable circumstances, and a large output of the precious metal is confidently expected.

One can hardly pick up an interior paper without meeting the suggestion that this or that locality offers unusual opportunities for a number of white men to engage in the business of raising vegetables for market in place of the Chinese. Land may be rented for a low price and the necessary outfit of implements, seed, etc., is not expensive and may be often secured on most favorable terms. No better way of "making a start" for many of the newcomers now pouring into the state can be imagined, since no great time need elapse after commencing operations before a crop of some kind is ready for sale, and as the business is nearly always a cash one, an income from almost the beginning is assured. It is to be hoped that the foolish manner too long prevalent of considering gardening as beneath the dignity of a white man will be done away with, and that before long every town in the state will be surrounded by a number of thrifty gardens under white management and supporting a goodly crop of white children.—S. F. Chronicle.

Timber Suits.

Washington, April 16.—Assistant Secretary of the Interior Muldron has requested the Attorney-General, in his judgment he deems it the interest of the United States, to institute civil proceedings against the firms of Ordway, Weidler & Co., also against Julius Ordway, G. W. Weidler, individually, all of Portland, Oregon, to recover in value at \$14,000 for 6,000,000 feet of timber, alleged to have been unlawfully taken from public land; also criminal proceedings against the said parties for trespass.

Dose of Their Own Medicine.

St. Louis, April 16.—Two deputy sheriffs, while guarding the Vandalaria railroad yards last night, were approached by a number of men, supposed to be strikers, who engaged them in conversation, during the progress of which they attacked the deputies and beat them badly. Upon the approach of several sentinels, who were on guard in adjacent yards, attracted by the cries of the deputies, the assailants escaped, leaving their victims in an unconscious condition.

A senator who has had nearly a score of years in public life and ripe experience in diplomacy has said that he believed the United States would get a tier of states off the northern boundary of Mexico before the end of another administration in this country.

"The state department," he said, "for three or four years has been on the alert in this matter, and the question has been a favored one since the first administration of General Grant. It is thought that we could make the annexation profitable by the mining interests there, and that we could solve the boundary troubles by securing a lump off of that republic. There would be enough Mexicans in the country we would get to warrant self protection. The difficulties between these states and the mother country could be fought out by the natives. I have heard it hinted that, incidentally, ex-Minister Foster, who has just visited Mexico, looked after the feeling there, in regard to annexation, and that upon his return he will lay before the state department some fresh information on the subject."

New Ruling.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, Washington, D. C., March 30, 1886.

To Registers and Receivers—Gentlemen: Hereafter the following rules will be observed in making final proof in pre-emption and commuted homestead cases:

1. The entire final proof, including the final affidavit of the claimant, his testimony, and the testimony of his witnesses, shall be taken before the officer designated in the published notice of intention to make final proof, and at the time therein named.

2. Such final proof shall be taken only before the following officers: The register or receiver of the proper land district, or the clerk of the county court, or any court of record, of the county and State or district and Territory, in which the land lies in an unorganized county.

3. Cases wherein notice of intention to make final proof shall have been given under the former practice, prior to the promulgation of this circular, shall be in no manner affected by the regulations herein contained.
