It is now believed that a deep-laid plot will be unearthed in regard to the assassination of President Garfield. The late United States Attorney Corkhill recently prepared a narrative for publication on the shooting of Garfield by Guiteau which contains some new and startling evidence to the effect that the murder was the result of a deep laid and diabolical plot, in which many persons were concerned. Corkhill has received letters from Guiteau's wife which implicates two prominent politicians in the plot. She claims to be able to show by legal evidence that by appointments long talks were had regarding the removal of Garfield over luncheons in a certain basement restaurant in Washington. Corkhill was a believer in the existence of a calmly developed conspiracy, whose plot covered even the flight of the assassin to Europe. He said he knew the vessel's name in which staterooms were taken for Guiteau, and the identity of the persons who were to assist him in his flight. The dates, the names of the men and the steamer were at finger's end. It is a most horrible and crushing array of allegations, whether correct or incorrect, that has ever been heard.

Remains of Devine Found.

While driving the stage from Empire to the Umpqua last Wednesday, Fred Jarvis found the body of a man on the Ten Mile beach, where it had been washed to the surf. It was at first thought to be the remains of one of the Columbia river fishermen, eight of whom were drowned lately, but a pocket book found on the body bore the name of the deceased, and identified it as that of Thos. Devine, who fell off the steamer Myrtle and was drowned in the lower bay on June 14th. The flesh was gone from the hands and feet, and the features were unrecognizable. Mr. Jarvis notified the authorities at Gardiner, and a coroner's inquest was held, which resulted in identifying the deceased as above, after which the remains were buried on the bluff, back of the beach.—Coos Bay News.
