Extinct Bison.
 Fort Keogh, Mont, Oct. 3.—W. L. Marnada and W. H. Brown, the Smithsonian buffalo hunters, sent out by the National museum at Washington, have left here for the Big Dry and Mussel Shell country, where they will remain until December. They were fitted out with teams, provisions and a military escort from this point, in addition to which a party of experienced cowboys accompanied them from Miles City. The only buffalo left in the whole Northwest are now roaming just where this party is going. Four years ago there were more than 200,000 head grazing in the Mussel Shell valley; to-day there are less than 200 head in the same district.

The business outlook for the whole country is very promising. A New York dispatch says: The business men here all agree that there has not been such a favorable outlook in years for trade. The leather merchants alone complain that their business has no share in the general prosperity. This good condition of affairs is not called a boom, on the contrary the merchants say they do not care to have a boom. The present condition of affairs is the result of a steady and healthy growth of business. Merchants have generally sold out their stocks and are now buying in rapidly, so that many mills and manufacturers find it difficult to keep up with their orders. This is the secret of the activity—the demand has caught up with the supply. In addition to this the World has dispatches from all the mercantile capitals of the country, which tell the same story.

London, Oct. 3.—An explosion occurred on Saturday at Alford's colliery at Wakefield, near Leeds. Eight men were rescued alive from the burning mine, seven were found dead, and seventeen are still missing. No hope is entertained that any of the latter will be found alive.

John O'Donnell, a San Francisco shoemaker, is insane a Wiggins victim. He was so sure that the latter's prediction regarding the destruction of his city would prove true that he lost his reason from mental strain.

On the 2nd inst. different parts of Germany were shaken by earthquake.

Summerville, S. C., was shaken with another shock of earthquake on the 3rd inst.

Hank Janell, ex-county clerk of Grant county, was shot a few days ago by Stephen Foster over a dog fight at Baker City.

Thousands of cattle are being smuggled across the line between British Columbia and Montana. Big seizures will follow.

The Canadian Pacific railroad had on the 3rd inst. reduced the price of passenger fare from San Francisco to Chicago to \$35.

A dispatch from London said that Mrs. Senator Mitchell and Mrs. Senator Dolph and daughter of Oregon would sail for America the 9th.

Henry Coffin was sent up from Modesto, Cal., for the murder of Mrs. Shoemaker. His sentence was two years and \$4000 fine which, since he has no money, will make the confinement upwards of 13 years.

The Portland News has made arrangements with the Bennett-Mackay telegraph line by which that paper will receive, daily, ten thousand words. This means that the News will be the best daily in the state. The line will reach Portland in less than two months.

Gen. Miles is being censured for accepting conditional terms of surrender from Geronimo. It is claimed that since the surrender was made to Capt. Lawton and Lieut. Gatewood, Miles' promises will amount to naught, unless it will be that of a trial by court-martial in which he will be the figure-head.

A Rich Load.
