The Wheat Supply.

Extract from a London letter: The continued large increase in the visible supply of wheat on your side is what entirely engrosses the attention of the trade here. It is remarked that in the face of such a liberal movement of new wheat, the crop must be larger than was thought, or that there must have been a larger quantity of old wheat on hand than we all believed to be the case. At any rate prices do not improve, and the sole reason is the large and ever visible supply in America. I do not, myself, believe in either of the two reasons given above. I believe that both the new crop and the old stocks have been rightly judged, and that American farmers are delivered thus freely, firstly, because they want to realize money at once, and secondly, because, rather than stand the chances of holding their

wheat for higher prices, as they did last year, and thus losing the market, they prefer to sell what I might call their surplus, and hold the remainder for higher prices. As I have said before, I believe every bushel of the presumed surplus in America will be wanted in Europe, and that therefore it is only a question of time before prices improve. It is, however, confessedly all the safer for the trade and for speculators in general, that American farmers have acted as they have, because they have by that means prevented a premature advance and premature speculation and allowed European buyers to purchase pretty freely of their wheat.
