#### Forfeited Lands.

The Interior Department, through Acting Land Commissioner Stockslager, has ordered the forfeiture of 1,200,000 acres granted to the Dalles military road—the lands to be open for location and settlement. The forfeiture of 4,000,000 acres granted to the Southern Pacific road in California is also ordered for restoration to the government. Unless provisions have been made for the protection of the rights of innocent purchasers in each case much hardship and considerable loss will be imposed upon these by this hasty, if not arbitrary, action of the Interior Department.—[Exchange.] Arbitrary or what not, it is the proper thing to do. Oregon has been robbed of millions of acres of land by these grants and the people will be glad that the work of forfeiture is beginning to operate in cases where the charters were totally disregarded or nearly so.

We regret that the late fair was not more of a success than it was, but if the people, or even the stockholders think that the officers can make it much of a success without their co-operation, they are away off. We must see that the produce and stock exhibit is forthcoming—it is us, the people, and not the officers that should bring these. It is true we want the annual fair, and more, we want it to be a success, and full of interest. To make it such, we will all have to work to that end, and we believe it is true that too much, in proportion to other things, is given for racing stock. Yet when we come to look at it rightly, we find that half the money given to owners of winning horses is paid by them in entrance fees. Probably a couple of hundred dollars might be taken from this and given for better purposes. It is evident that people care nothing for the premiums paid for racing and with the usual amount of jockeying, it is plain that the end aimed at is not reached. This is to be seen in the fact that to-day the people know as little about the speed of the horses as they did before going there. An honest trial of speed is what the society is aiming at, and when a horse is distanced to-day by a horse that he distanced the day before, and this becoming a regular thing, it is time that such jockeying be allowed to pay its own way. As proof that these sports care nothing for the amount offered by the society, we have but to call to mind that it is hard to fill up races, when horses have been in training for a long time and are anxious to secure a private race on the outside. It were better to give only diplomas and the entrance fees, and give the money to the encouragement of something more reliable than racing and racing stock. As long as gambling is connected with it, so long will the people be in doubt, and justly so, too, as to the fitness of the horses of the district.

#### Senator Mitchell Here.

United States Senator John H. Mitchell arrived here last Thursday, and proceeded up to the fair at Halls prairie. In the evening he returned here and delivered a very interesting speech in the Masonic hall. He is a very able speaker, and speaking of our resources, and of the government appropriations for our local harbors the people appreciated it very much.

#### San Diego's Railroad.

San Diego, Sept. 1.—The survey of the Peninsula Railway in Lower California was formally begun at San Carlos city yesterday. The road is to be built at once, and will extend from Eusebiada and San Carlos to San Diego on the west and Yuma on the east, thus making a connection between this city and Yuma. The completion of this road places San Diego on a direct line to the East, and will be the most important event since the construction of the first railway to this city.

#### Chicago's Opium Joins.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 30.—Opium joints are said to be increasing in this city to an enormous extent, and a committee that is collecting facts and figures in relation to the subject expects to shortly be in a position to lay a startling exhibit before the Mayor. There are not less than fifty places in the city where facilities are afforded to those who are desirous of "hitting the pipe." The majority of these are run under the cover of Chinese laundries, and are extensively patronized both night and day, the unfortunate patrons coming from the very highest as well as the lowest grades of society. Some of these dens are magnificently furnished and an introduction from some one known to the keeper, as well as a fee of \$15 is necessary to secure admission. The laundry business in the front part of the dens is merely a cover to the nefarious work which is in progress in the rear and many of the opium dive keepers have found the business so profitable that both night and day games of washie-washies are employed on the stool pigeon style, in order that the dive may never be closed. Mayor Roche is credited with the statement that the work of the moral purification of the city will be pushed in every direction.

Paris, Aug. 29.—An oculist named Padrona, murdered his wife and two children yesterday. He shot Madam Padrona six times in the face, and cut the throats of his two year-old boy and three-year-old girl. Padrona who is a Corsican, was jealous, and an inveterate drinker.
