County Court Proceedings.

September Term, 1887. In the matter of persons driving faster than a walk over the public bridges in Coos county, Oregon: WHEREAS, Complaint has been made to this Court that persons have been in the habit of driving faster than a walk over the public bridges of Coos county, Oregon, contrary to the provisions of the law of this state regulating travel over such bridges which said law reads as follows: SECTION 1. "If any persons shall willfully ride or drive over any public bridge of this state at a greater speed than a walk or shall drive at any one time more than twenty head of cattle, horses or mules over such bridge, any such person, upon conviction thereof, before any justice of the peace, or other court of competent jurisdiction shall be punished by a fine not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars. Now, therefore, all persons are hereby warned against violating the provisions of said section, and the road supervisors of the respective districts of this county will please warn all persons that they may know of violating the provisions of said section that said law will be enforced as the public bridges in this county are becoming greatly damaged by reasons of the violations of the provisions of said section.
